Pillars of a Successful Zero Waste Program



Primary Objectives of Report





- 1. Require buildings to have a recycling program
- 2. Align banned material lists with current program and policies
- 3. Enable Municipal Ticketing Information system for enforcement
- 4. Investigate regulatory options for single use items eg. coffee cups, plastic shopping bags and expanded polystyrene fast food packaging could include bans or take back.

Regulation and Enforcement



Currently:

Bans on disposal of recyclables enforced at transfer station and landfill only. No requirement for buildings to have a recycling program.

Proposed:

Require recycling programs at the building level.

E.g. 2015 Food Waste requirement

By-law Enforcement



Currently: **Prosecution Time consuming, costly**Minimum fine - \$250

Recommended: Ticketing Municipal Ticket Information System
More efficient

Ticket Structure:

- General Non-Compliance \$100
- Offences with larger impact \$250
- Fail to obey order under the by-law \$500

Education and warnings will continue to be primary tactics



Enforcement of Solid Waste-Related Offences



Areas of focus:

- Commercial waste containers, and illegal dumping— areas of biggest concern
- Garbage in Green Bins a few chronic offenders
- Unsecured loads and leaking commercial waste collection trucks.



Single Use, Disposable Items



Assess our ability and authority to:

- 1. Ban use
- 2. Apply deposits/fee
- 3. Mandate recycling
- 4. Require Take Back programs
