




Healthy City Action Plan 2015 -2018 Implementation

- Approval in principle of \$1 million grant to St. Paul's Mental Health Hub
- Report back for formal approval

Report Recommendations

- A. Approve \$1,000,000 Innovation Fund Grant to St. Paul's Foundation towards capital portion of the HUB
- B. Authorize the negotiation and dispersal of the grant by General Manager, Community Services
- C. Approve no legal rights or obligations until legal documentation executed and delivered






Example of Potential Hub Layout



Outcomes: Systems Transformation

- Reduce costly crisis intervention
 - St. Michael's Hospital (Toronto): 70% reduction in readmission
- Link people to supports prior to discharge
- Contribute to creation of mental health and addictions system and recovery-based care



TRC Calls to Action

- Sustainable funding for existing and new Aboriginal healing centres
- Recognize the value of Aboriginal healing practices and use them in treatment





Outcomes: Costs and Benefits

City already incurs costs of insufficient treatment and supports

Estimated \$30M annually (2009)

- Police and first responders
- Emergency housing
- Capital for housing
- Homelessness outreach
- Social grants

Opportunity to avoid crisis and support a people centred, recovery based system
