SUBJECT: 2017 Homelessness Action Week (HAW) Grants

RECOMMENDATION

- A. THAT Council champion Vancouver's 2017 Homelessness Action Week by supporting neighbourhood responses to homelessness.
- B. THAT Council approve an allocation of \$43,000 in grants as outlined in Appendix A to create awareness about and engage citizens on solutions to homelessness through a variety of events during Homelessness Action Week (October 8 14, 2017) and throughout the year; source of funds to be the 2017 Community Services Operating Budget Street Homelessness.
- C. THAT Council direct staff to report back by October 3, 2017 to proclaim HAW 2017 and showcase actions and events being planned.

REPORT SUMMARY

The 2017 Homelessness Action Week (HAW) is the 12th annual Metro Vancouver campaign aimed at raising awareness about and building local capacity for solutions to homelessness. This report recommends that the City support 17 community organizations to host events during HAW and throughout the year to promote HAW and connections with their local homeless populations. The \$43,000 in grants will come from the 2017 Community Services Operating Budget - Street Homelessness.

REPORT

Background/Context

The 12th annual Homelessness Action Week will take place across Lower Mainland municipalities from October 8th to 14th, 2017. Until 2013, Homelessness Action Week was coordinated and funded across the region through the Metro Vancouver Homelessness Secretariat (MVHS) under the federal Homelessness Partnering Strategy (HPS). Changes to HPS funding criteria in 2014 resulted in all HPS funding being targeted for Housing First initiatives and away from initiatives such as HAW. Despite the loss of MVHS coordination and support, Homelessness Action Week will once again take place throughout the region, with regional coordination occurring through the Council of Metro Vancouver Community Homeless Tables and local funding and coordination at the level of each municipality. Notwithstanding the withdrawal of the Federal Government as a funding partner, Homelessness Action Week will continue to provide a unique opportunity regionally and locally to engage citizens, the media and the private and non-profit sectors on the causes of and solutions to homelessness.

HAW 2017 in Vancouver builds on the success of partnerships between the City, the Province and other private and not-for-profit partners to reduce homelessness through a diversity of responses across the city, including providing outreach services to people who are homeless and at risk of homelessness, opening low-barrier temporary winter response shelters, opening warming centres in extremely cold weather, building new social and supportive housing, and supporting our non-profit partners to improve liveability and conditions in single-room occupancy (SRO) hotels.

The purpose of this report is to seek Council approval for a variety of community and grassroots initiatives that will support positive and engaging events taking place in Vancouver during HAW and throughout the year. The City of Vancouver has played an integral leadership role in initiating and supporting HAW since its inception, and continues to strive to generate more events, activities and interest each year:

- In 2009, the City provided \$9,300 to four community groups (RTS 08283)
- In 2010, the City provided \$10,500 to five community groups (RTS 08788)
- In 2011, the City provided \$25,000 to nine community groups (RTS 09325)
- In 2012, the City provided \$30,000 to eleven community groups (RTS 9581)
- In 2013, the City provided \$35,000 to eighteen community groups (RTS 10135)
- In 2014, the City provided \$40,000 to sixteen community groups (RTS 10619)
- In 2015, the City provided \$43,000 to eighteen community groups (RTS 10980)
- In 2016, the City provided \$36,650 to thirteen community groups (RTS 11433)

Community interest has grown overall since 2009. Grant funds have contributed to uniting Vancouverites in a common goal to raise awareness about and create solutions to the issues of homelessness, and support organizations providing direct services to homeless individuals. This year, \$85,748 in grant requests was received from 29 Vancouver non-profit societies. Staff recommends allocating \$43,000 to fund 17 of these requests (see Appendix A).

Staff will report back by early October, 2017 to provide Council with an opportunity to proclaim October 8th to 14th as Homelessness Action Week, and to provide Council with more detailed information on the events and projects taking place for HAW 2017.

2017 HAW Grants

The goals of Vancouver 2017 HAW Grants include:

- 1. Creating innovative solutions to local homelessness and supporting new approaches and opportunities that prevent or eliminate homelessness.
- 2. Building the capacity of neighbourhoods to raise awareness about and respond to issues of homelessness.
- 3. Building healthy, safe and inclusive communities in neighbourhoods across the city.
- 4. Supporting existing and creating new partnerships and leveraging opportunities to address homelessness and affordable housing needs.

These four goals are aligned with the priority actions of the *Housing & Homelessness Strategy 2012-2021 Strategic Direction 3: Provide strong leadership and support to partners to enhance housing stability.* The priority actions speak to research and innovation, improvements in health and safety, and partnering opportunities for prevention and elimination of homelessness.

Community groups are important partners in helping to achieve desired outcomes. HAW grants enable the City to develop new relationships with non-profit community groups and nurture existing ones.

A formal call for proposals to host events or organize projects supporting the four HAW goals during the week of HAW 2017 and throughout the year resulted in 29 applications totalling \$85,748 in requests. Total available funds are \$43,000 from which an applicant may receive a maximum of \$3,000. Grant application forms were available online. Of the 29 applications, this report recommends approval of 17 grants that were reviewed and assessed according to the following criteria:

- Projects had to be designed to directly benefit people who are homeless or at risk of homelessness within local neighbourhoods
- Organizations had to:
 - Be a registered non-profit society based in Vancouver
 - Have a proven track record for delivering projects, services and/or hosting events,

- Demonstrate a strong level of partnership with a range of key local stakeholders
- Priority was given to projects that are not part of ongoing operations or programming
- Priority was given to projects that leveraged funding from other sources

Each applicant was eligible to receive one grant. Applicants who had received HAW grants in the past were eligible to apply. Projects being recommended for funding provide unique opportunities for capacity and skills development, awareness raising and direct access to resources and services for the homeless and those at risk. Personal stories of overcoming mental health and addiction and/or struggles with homelessness humanize this very tragic issue. Some of the grants being recommended in this report support giving voice to individuals who are homeless through dialogue and the visual arts. Other grants provide the opportunity for people who are homeless or at risk to connect with a range of service providers in their communities.

Interest in the HAW grants program this year was the strongest since 2009. While all applicants met some of the eligibility criteria, those being recommended in this report more strongly supported the goals and criteria set out in the proposal call. Staff will work with unsuccessful applicants to build capacity for future years.

The Table in Appendix A summarizes the applications received and the recommended level of each.

Other HAW Events

Homeless Connect Events

Since 2009, the City has hosted Homeless Connect Events. These events, along with similar events organized by grant recipients (see Appendix A), connect people who are homeless and those at risk to a range of services, such as health and dental services, access to income assistance and the BC Housing registry, haircuts, foot care, food, etc. Over the years, COV-sponsored Connect events have taken place at the Carnegie Library (Alley Health Fair), the Gathering Place Community Centre (Gathering Place Connect) and the Evelyne Saller Community Centre (Evelyne Saller Community Connect). This year, the Alley Health Fair is being coordinated by the Downtown Eastside Neighbourhood House non-profit society, and as such is being recommended for a HAW grant (see Appendix A). The Evelyne Saller Community Centre and the Gathering Place Community Centre will be hosting their 2017 Connect events in the fall of 2017.

2017 City-Sponsored Event

Staff members are in preliminary discussion with the Aboriginal Homelessness Steering Committee about partnering on an event that focusses on raising awareness about Aboriginal homelessness and related issues during HAW in October. People of Aboriginal origin continue to be over-represented in homelessness in Vancouver and across the region. The proposed event will highlight the significance and complexity of the issue, its colonial history and solutions. In 2014, the City was designated a City of

reconciliation. In 2017, the City, in partnership with our three Host Nations, the Musqueam, Squamish and Tsleil-Waututh First Nations, is hosting Canada 150+. As such, HAW 2017 presents a unique opportunity to highlight issues of Aboriginal homelessness and stories of strength, healing and success.

Communications Plan

Staff are working with Corporate Communications to draft a comprehensive Communications Plan for HAW 2017. A calendar of events and activities will be created and posted on the City's website and the regional HAW website: www.stophomelessness.ca.

Strategic Analysis

Implications/Related Issues/Risk (if applicable)

Financial

This report recommends Council approve \$43,000 in grants to 17 non-profit organizations. The source of funds is the 2017 Community Services Operating Budget - Street Homelessness.

Social Implications

Homelessness involves severe human suffering and represents a loss of individual potential. It also poses significant costs to our health, social services and criminal justice systems. Homelessness Action Week provides the opportunity to engage residents in raising awareness about homelessness issues and in providing direct support to those who are homeless. Targeting our limited resources to proactive social objectives promotes healthy and inclusive neighbourhoods and positively impacts the quality of life for all Vancouver citizens.

CONCLUSION

This report seeks Council approval of \$43,000 in grants to support a variety of grassroots, positive and engaging events and initiatives taking place for Vancouver's 2017 Homelessness Action Week (October 8th to 14th, 2017).
