



BC Illicit Drug Overdose Deaths 1991-2017





Proportion of Fentanyl-detected deaths in 2016 and 2017 YTD is 15-20X higher than 2012.


Vancouver – Illicit Drug Overdose Deaths 2016/17








Number of opioid-related overdoses presenting at VCH EDs, 2015-2017 YTD


Naloxone

- 92 distribution sites in Vancouver
 - DTES 33
 - City Center 31
 - Midtown 13
 - Westside 9
 - South 4
 - Northeast 2
- 16,237 kits distributed
 2015-2017
- 4,207 reported used to treat overdoses



Addiction Treatment

- St. Paul's Rapid Access
 Addiction Centre
 - 1,500 clients since Oct.2016 opening
- VCH Connections Clinic
 - Opened Feb. 2017
- Expansion of injectable
 Opioid Agonist Therapy
 - Crosstown Clinic
 - Other models





Drug Checking

- Fentanyl test strips
 - Piloted at Insite
 - Positive test: Reduction in dose and lower risk of overdose
 - Now available at Insite,
 Powell Street Getaway,
 Overdose Prevention Sites
- Spectrometer: City of Vancouver and BC Centre for Substance Use
 - Insite and Powell Street Getaway pilot



Overdose Emergency Response Centre

- Announced Dec. 1, 2017 by Minister Judy Darcy
- Located at Emergency Operations Centre, Vancouver General Hospital



Overdose Emergency Response Centre

- On-going crisis requires streamlined, scaled-up strategy
- Builds on work to date and addresses gaps
- Led by the Ministry for Mental Health and Addictions in partnership with Health, Public Safety and Social ministries
- Strong focus on <u>local</u>, <u>action-oriented</u>, <u>rapid</u>
 <u>response</u>

Comprehensive Package of Interventions

Essential Health Sector Interventions	Essential Strategies for a Supportive Environment
Naloxone Ensuring optimal supplies, training and community-level infrastructure to ensure sustained Naloxone access.	Social stabilization Community-level strategies to ensure on-going psycho-social support, access to housing, income stabilization, transportation, food.
Overdose Prevention Services Supporting a diversity of community-level, low barrier services tailored to population/ community needs.	Peer empowerment and employment Providing individual skills and capacity building initiatives within individuals and communities with lived experience.
Acute overdose risk case management Robust surveillance, analytics and referral system to identify individuals at risk within communities and capacity for follow-up connection to care.	Cultural safety and humility In collaboration with Indigenous communities and organizations, ensuring services are rooted in an understanding of the social and historical context of health and healthcare inequities.
Treatment and Recovery Ensuring low-barrier access to full spectrum of evidence-based medications and comprehensive treatment and recovery services.	Addressing stigma, discrimination, and human rights Policy/legal analysis and action plans to address barriers to services based on stigma and discrimination.

Examples of Priority Strategies

- Outreach Teams
 - Connect to those at high risk of overdose
 - Vancouver: Referral directly from hospital emergency departments
- Drug Checking
- Expansion of Opioid Agonist Therapy
 - Oral and injectable
 - Training and support for primary care providers
- Addressing risk of using alone indoors
- New, innovative strategies
