RECOMMENDATION

- A. THAT Council approve 40 Childcare Program Enhancement Grants totalling \$247,380 as listed in APPENDIX A, with conditions as noted; source of funds: 2005 Childcare Grants Budget, 2005 Operating Budget;
- B. THAT Council approve 21 Inner-City Childcare Sustaining Grants totalling \$235,000 as listed in APPENDIX A, with conditions as noted; source of funds: 2005 Childcare Grants Budgets, 2005 Operating Budget;
- C. THAT Council approve 40 Inner-City Childcare Bursary Grants totalling \$141,670 as listed in APPENDIX A, with conditions as noted; source of funds: 2005 Childcare Grants Budgets, 2005 Operating Budget.
- D. THAT Council approve 4 Stabilization Grants; at \$5,000 per grant, totalling \$20,000 to: Franklin Preschool, St. Davids Preschool, Mt. Pleasant Neighbourhood House Preschool and Poppins Preschool, source of funds: 2005 Child Care Grant Budget, 2005 Operating Budget.

GENERAL MANAGER'S COMMENTS

The General Manager of Community Services RECOMMENDS approval of A, B, C and D.

COUNCIL POLICY

Council established the annual Civic Childcare Grants Program on October 23, 1990, as part of the Civic Childcare Strategy. The overall objectives of this grant program are:

- to support the viability, accessibility and quality of existing child care services;
- to assist child care initiatives in high need areas;
- to encourage and support efficient, coordinated administrative services required for a child care system in Vancouver;
- to lever other sources of child care funding whenever possible.

Council approved "Moving Forward" - Childcare: A Cornerstone of Childhood Development in April, 2002, which set out a strategic plan for child care and child development services for the City.

In April, 2005, Council approved the 2005 Operating Budget, which included an adjustment that limited the inflationary increase for the City grants programs to 2%. It also approved an additional \$150,000 to the Civic Childcare Grants budget, for a total budget of \$1,054,200.

In May, 2005, Council approved combining the Inner City Childcare Sustaining, Program Enhancement and Inner City Bursary grants into one operating child care grant, based on centres' licensed capacity for high need areas, and tie to conditions of quality and affordability.

Approval of grant recommendations requires eight affirmative votes.

SUMMARY

This report recommends the allocations for the Civic Childcare Grants, specifically the Program Enhancement Grant, Inner City Childcare Sustaining, Inner City Bursary Grant and Program Stabilization Grant. These operating grants assist programs that serve a population of high need children and/or low income families. Funding is provided on an annual basis to offset the cost of fees, extra staff ratio, quality enhancement, coordinated administration and food programs.

PURPOSE

This report makes recommendations for the following Childcare Grant categories:

- Program Enhancement
- Inner-City Childcare Sustaining
- Inner City Bursary Grant
- Program Stabilization Grant

This is the second of three reports regarding the 2005 Childcare Grants Program.

BACKGROUND

Last year, Council approved an allocation for the 2004 Childcare Grants as follows:

- 31 Program Enhancement grants \$126,150;
- 31 Inner-City Childcare Sustaining grants \$232,025;
- 41 Inner-City Bursary grants \$161,084.
- 1 Program Stabilization Grant \$5,000.

DISCUSSION

The focus of this report is on the Childcare Grants Program – Program Enhancement, Inner-City Childcare Sustaining and Inner City Bursary grant categories. Demand for all grants funding continues to exceed budget allocations. This year, 57 programs applied requesting a total of \$1,124,756. Of these, \$466,340 were for Program Enhancement Grant category, \$414,524 for Inner City Childcare Sustaining Grant category and \$243,892 for the Inner City Bursary Grant category. The maximum eligible amounts for each childcare program are: Program Enhancement Grant \$10,500, Inner City Childcare Sustaining Grant \$12,750 and Inner City Bursary Grant \$28 per child for 11 months, based on the difference between enrolment and capacity plus 20% of the licensed capacity. Grant funding will support an estimated 2,900 children in 2,100 licensed group child care spaces in 52 childcare programs.

This year's application amount exceeded all previous years. Social Planning has tried to make recommendations which stretch the City dollars for the benefit of as many families and children as possible; however, a number of programs did not qualify for Inner City Childcare Sustaining grant this year because they did not meet the specific criteria of:

- Fees are lower than City average;
- Clearly serving a high need, 'at risk' population/neighbourhood; and,
- Providing care to a significant percentage of children whose parents are in receipt of childcare subsidy.

In total, 6 Program Enhancement, 14 Inner City Childcare Sustaining and 8 Inner City Bursary grant applications were deemed ineligible as they did not meet the grant criteria. Some applicants were eligible for all grant categories' funding.

GRANT REVIEW PROCESS:

The grant review process this year included a review of all applications for completeness, and site visits/interviews, which were conducted by the Child Development Co-ordinator and a Social Planner. A grant review team, comprised of a Vancouver Coastal Health (VCH) Childcare Licensing Officer, a VCH Nutritionist and Social Planning staff, was established. Vancouver Coastal Health staff have been very supportive in providing expertise on food quality and program enhancement issues. For example, Social Planning Department has engaged the support of a VCH nutritionist to review and comment on menu plans, recognizing the need to maximize nutritional value. In addition, Social Planning Department, in partnership with Westcoast and the VCH, hosted two workshops on menu planning for grant recipients. Since this process was implemented, staff have noticed a marked improvement in the quality of hot lunches and snacks being served.

The review team established weightings based on program type, purpose of grant, financial reporting, wages, administration costs, program expenses, fees in relation to City average, client profiles and completeness of previous year's conditions.

1. Program Enhancement Grants

The purpose of these grants (maximum \$10,500 per organization) is to provide non-profit, licensed child care programs with funds to enhance the quality of care offered. This initiative is for food supplement, offsetting infant/toddler fees for low income families, strengthening coordinated administration and continuous quality improvement initiatives.

To qualify for Program Enhancement grant funding, in addition to criteria of good governance, programs must specifically meet the following criteria:

- Serve a moderate to high percentage of children from families in two or more of the following areas:
 - o who are aboriginal or refugee/new immigrants;
 - o whose mother tongue is a language other than English;
 - o who are single parents and/or who have low incomes.

In total, 46 Program Enhancement grant applications were received. All applications, except six, were determined to be eligible for funding. Those deemed ineligible did not meet the funding criteria. Social Planning Department is recommending approval of Program Enhancement Grants for a total of \$247,380 (see APPENDIX A).

2. Inner-City Childcare Sustaining Grants

The purpose of these grants is to provide non-profit organizations with up to \$12,750 to offset costs related to enhancing staff ratios to better serve high need children and keeping parent fees below City average.

Programs eligible for Inner-City Childcare Sustaining Grant funding are considered to have met the Program Enhancement Grant criteria and, in addition:

- operate a childcare program located in or immediately adjacent to an Inner-City school project, or clearly stand out as serving high need, low income families;
- are working closely with neighbourhood agencies to meet the needs of Inner-City families;
- serve a significant number of the children designated as "at risk" by the Ministry for Children and Family Development or require extra family support and/or are considered to be living in high need environment;
- charge user fees at or below the City average; and
- provide care to a significant percentage of children whose parents are in receipt of childcare subsidy.

Thirty-five (35) childcare programs applied for funding under the Inner-City Grant category. Fourteen (14) applicants were deemed ineligible for Inner-City Childcare Sustaining Grant funding, as they did not meet the grant criteria, primarily because their client profile did not demonstrate service to a significant number of children on subsidy. Historically, many of these programs have been eligible and are located in one of the five areas of the city (e.g., Strathcona, Mt. Pleasant, Kensington-Cedar Cottage, Sunset, Renfrew-Collingwood), where children are deemed most vulnerable on the Early Development Instrument by Dr. Clyde Hertzman.

Social Planning recommends approval of 21 Inner-City Childcare Sustaining grants for a total of \$235,000(see APPENDIX A).

3. Inner City Bursary Grants

The purpose of this grant is to provide fee assistance to low income families in high need areas to retain and increase enrolment by increasing the affordability for families. This grant was implemented by Council two years ago to mitigate the impact of Provincial subsidy and operating policy changes on inner city programs. Programs experienced a drop in enrolment as families lost subsidies or had subsidises reduced, creating financial hardship for some families to retain their child care spaces. Programs which historically qualified for Inner City Childcare Sustaining grants or which experienced significant enrolment losses, were deemed eligible.

The grant is calculated using the difference between enrolment and licensed capacity plus 20% of the licensed spaces, multiplied by \$28 per space for eleven months. Program enrolment must remain at a viable level to receive this grant. Programs are required to have an internal subsidy policy for administering this grant.

Forty-seven (47) programs applied for Bursary Grants. Eight (8) were deemed ineligible, as they had not historically received Inner City funding and/or were at full enrolment. Social Planning Department recommends approval of Inner-City Childcare Bursary Grants for a total of \$141,670 (see APPENDIX A).

GRANT VISITS - Themes and Trends

The Child Development Coordinator and a Social Planner visited all of the organizations that applied for Inner City Childcare Sustaining grants. As part of the visits, staff and board members from the respective organizations were asked to share any trends, themes, issues or challenges they have experienced over the past year. Three themes have emerged this year - subsidy, fragility of families and financial vulnerability.

<u>Subsidy</u>

This year, almost every operator expressed significant challenges with the centralized approach to administration of the Provincial Childcare Subsidy. The Ministry of Human Resources is responsible for managing the child care subsidy on behalf of the Ministry of Child and Family Development. Over the past few years, significant changes have been made to both the subsidy policies and administration. Vancouver parents must apply for subsidy either by phone or internet to a central site in Richmond. This has eliminated much of the personal contact with Financial Aid and Social Workers. In addition, forms and recordings are only available in English.

Families

Programs reported the following barriers to families accessing subsidy

- No access to phone or internet impacting families' ability to apply;
- Non-English speaking families could not understand recorded message;
- Families are required to reapply every month or two for subsidy;
- Workers on Subsidy Call line were poorly informed about files or had lost files;
- Families are having to talk to a different worker every time they call, calls are not returned, or they are poorly treated by the Subsidy Call line staff;
- Families who were deemed ineligible in early Provincial subsidy policy changes, who were then deemed eligible when policy was modified but were now unable to have access to space;
- The Richmond office is inaccessible or too costly for families to go to visit in person;
- High number of applications are returned as incomplete;
- Number of students getting the incorrect amount of subsidy if reporting four days of school when not knowing to report doing homework or labs on fifth day.
- Aboriginal families being required to go through two screening processes for subsidy.

Programs

Programs directly experienced the following barriers:

- Long delays up to six months in receiving authorizations for subsidy payments on behalf of families (some of most challenging delays have been for children in the care of Ministry);
- Programs having to carry the costs of delayed subsidy payments, affecting cash flow;
- Programs serving families for three and four months without confirmation of payment, often to find out the family was deemed ineligible;
- Increasing bad debt when families were unable to pay;
- Receiving subsidy for half month's fees instead of full month;
- Increased child care staff time to help families with application process;
- Staff not being able to access subsidy information to help families;
- Pressure on programs to accept full fee paying families in place of subsidized families;
- Full fee paying parents offering "incentives" for spaces.

Programs indicated that the subsidy situation is the worse they have experienced and noted that there is a downward trend in the number of children on subsidy within their programs. They also reported that they are getting an increased number of calls from parents with three year olds who are required to return to work and are seeking quality affordable childcare. The most compelling story staff heard during grant visits this year was about a mom coming off income assistance, who had the potential of a \$28 per hour paying job, which she had to forgo because she could not find licensed group child care.

Fragility of Families

Inner City Childcare programs located in community centres reported that there was an increasing incidence of school age children "hanging around" the community centre as an alternative to school age care and as a way to ensure some form of adult observation in a safe environment.

Another inner city program reported the increase in the complexity of family issues, such as families living in shelters and families being evicted from their homes.

Financial Viability

A number of child care programs this year have indicated that they will have to use reserve funds to offset budget shortfalls, and/or in the case of multi-service programs, will be subsidized by revenues from other non-child care related programs.

4. Stabilization Grant

The Stabilization Grant is allocated to programs that have experienced significant hardship and may need one-time assistance to increase viability. This year, 14 programs, which historically have qualified for Inner City Childcare Sustaining grants, did not qualify as they no longer served a significant number of families who received the Provincial Childcare subsidy. These centres, however, are continuing to enrol/serve high need families but are using internal subsidies to support them, recognizing that families are not being successful with accessing subsidy. This has led to subsidization by organizations for needy families or for families to absorb costs and make cuts to family budgets to afford child care. This was a particularly challenging year for Social Planning Department staff to evaluate programs based on the grant criteria because of this factor.

Four of the non-qualifying programs - Mt. Pleasant Neighbourhood House Preschool, St. David's Preschool, Franklin Preschool, and Poppins Preschool - will experience a decrease in their overall City funding by more than \$10,000. In order to prevent the destabilizing of these programs, the Child Development Coordinator is recommending a \$5,000 Stabilization grant to each of the four programs. This would be a one-time only grant, based on the programs previous year's qualifying status and the funds would be used to assist with maintaining fees below City average.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

The 2005 Operating Budget for Civic Childcare Grants is \$1,054,200, with \$247,380 proposed to be allocated for Program Enhancement Grants, \$235,000 Inner-City Childcare Sustaining Grant and \$141,670 for Inner City Bursary Grants (as listed in APPENNDIX A). The proposed operating budget also includes \$20,000 for four Program Stabilization grants. Council should note that the additional \$150,000 approved to the Child Care Budget has assisted in the development and administration of #1 Kingsway and added \$125,000 to the Program Enhancement and Inner City Childcare Sustaining grants to support over 2,900 children.

CONCLUSION

This is the second of three reports related to the allocation of the 2005 Childcare Grants. Social Planning Department is recommending Council approval for:

- Program Enhancement grants \$ 247,380
- Inner-City Childcare Sustaining grants \$235,000
- Inner-City Bursary Grant \$141,670
- Stabilization Grant \$20,000

This grant funding will support over 2,900 children in 2,100 licensed group child care in 55 programs. This leaves a balance of \$37,850 in the Childcare Grants budget for allocation later this year.
