Dear Mayor & City Council,

I am opposed to the public bike rental share system and change of bylaws noted for discussion at this meeting, and at this present time. I am writing since I will be unable to attend the public hearing as scheduled.

This is a premature and costly initiative, that precludes improving desperately needed transit and transportation needs of our City, and the lack of Translink funding to upgrade and increase services is well known. This initiative will increase tax burdens on citizens without reducing dependence on cars, decreasing congestion & emissions, and without increasing transit options. It will also take away revenue from small bike rental businesses that currently serve the city & tourism.

Improving Transit & additional funding for Translink must take higher precedence than a rental bike program, in order to get more citizens out of their cars and ease increasing traffic congestion, and along with the foresight of budgeting for more rapid transit lines & transit services. If current and future transportation in the City is first budgeted and built, then I can see merit in such a program, in areas that do not affect existing small businesses. Otherwise, it is puts the cart before the horse.
