

- \$391,500 distributed across 17 projects
- Grants from \$1,500 to \$50,000
- Energy efficiency for small businesses, an urban orchard employing DTES residents, multi-family food scrap recycling, cycling courses and bikes for low income residents, tree planting on private property and more
