Context Vancouver's Cultural Economy

GDP/Employment (Stats Can - Metro Vancouver)

- 1 in 13 jobs in Vancouver are in cultural sector (7.7% of total jobs)
- Provincial GDP contribution of arts and recreation sector: \$8.2 billion
- 64% of BC artists and cultural workers live/work in Vancouver
- Vancouver's arts and recreation sector GDP is estimated at \$5.25 billion

Cultural Spending (Hill Strategies, 2008, 2012)

- \$1.8 billion in Vancouver (49% of provincial total)
- Vancouverites' cultural spending was \$795 per capita

Return on Investment (Canadian Arts Database – 106 orgs - 2010-11)

- For every \$1 invested by the City in cultural operating grants
 - •\$16.24 is raised from other sources



Document Review

- Foundation work provides due diligence
- Expansion on existing site not viable
- Satellites are inefficient and expensive
- New gallery at 688 Cambie is well positioned to move forward

2012

Site Review Post Office & 688 Cambie

- Space program responds to long term needs
- PO complex, not likely to provide savings
- Cost to purchase building would significantly increase required costs
- 688 Cambie:
 - best meets vision/needs
 - allows City contribution to be land

City Consultation Feedback Summary

Vancouver is at forefront of visual culture internationally

New gallery needed – ongoing exhibition of Vancouver's collection; new programs

- 688 Cambie seen as ideal site
- Key to launching Vancouver's long term cultural vision and strategy
- Will enable significant expansion of Vancouver's "cultural capital" and sustainability
- Will expand the cultural, social and community space in the heart of downtown

City should take a leadership role

Vancouver's contemporary artists world renown

Gallery successful leader in contemporary art

- Gallery has had enormous business success in:
 - Acquisitions
 - Fundraising
 - Attendance, and attracting young diverse audiences
 - Delivering diverse programming
 - New memberships
 - Positive relationships with local artist

New Gallery would better serve artist, residents, tourists, local, regional, national visual art organizations, community engagement and pride

New purpose built Gallery at 688 Cambie best most cost effective sustainable model

Need to identify key expectations, decision points and timelines



New Gallery Funding Construct

Funding Model

- \$150 M Private fundraising
 - (includes \$50 M more to endowment)
- \$50 M current zoning land value – City
- \$100 M Provincial
- \$100 M Federal



Committed

- \$40 M Private pledges
- \$11 M CurrentOperatingEndowment
- City land commitment pending
- \$50 M Provincial received



688 Cambie Financial Encumbrance

Civic Theatres upgrades - prior to 2010 Olympic Winter Games

- Major investment in cultural sector
- Loan encumbered to 688 Cambie
- \$40.0 M loan (plus \$10.2 M interest = \$50.2 M)

Council (05/06): sale of remainder of 688 Cambie be used to pay off Civic Theatres upgrades (if no Fed/Prov funding received)

• Ultimately, no Federal/Provincial funding was provided



688 Cambie **Planning Considerations**

3 Acre Site – divided into 2 parcels

- 1.8 acres required for new Gallery
- Remainder of Site to be sold

Staff explored various Site configurations to combine south portion of Cambie with VAG portion of 688 Cambie site

- Intent to integrate new gallery with QET Plaza
- Maximize value of the remainder of 688 Cambie (~1.2 acres)



Planning Considerations Integration with QET Plaza

Cultural Precinct

- Prominent Georgia Street frontage for Gallery
- Adjacent to CBC, Library, Civic Theatres
- Close to transit

Concept of closing a portion of Cambie to integrate with the Queen Elizabeth Theatre Plaza

Unified social public space



Planning Considerations Maximum Value | Remainder of Site

Downtown ODP area C1 (CBD)

- Current zoning: Minimum 7 FSR commercial to meet Metro Core Jobs Strategy
- View Corridor Building heights limited to ~200'
- Zoning & size of site allows Council to consider residential density to support public benefits (if 7 FSR commercial provided concurrently)

Value of highest and best use of remainder of Site can leverage funds required to pay off loan



Recommendations For Gallery Project Proposal

MOU for a lease on the City owned site at or adjacent to 688 Cambie - 1.8 acres, 99 years – nominal rent inclusive of taxes

City to pay for environmental remediation



Recommendations For Gallery Project Proposal

Lease conditions

- April 30, 2015 Major government funding agreements confirmed -Province of BC – additional \$50M; Gov. of Canada: \$100M
- Dec 30, 2015 (or earlier) Lease & funding agreements approved by Council with issuance of Development Permit conditional on:
 - Confirmation of 75% of the funding for then current total project budget (~\$350M – includes endowment and all soft and hard costs)
 - Project scope at DP must align with what is described in this report
 - Gallery must raise any additional funds required should costs escalate
 - Arrangement must be in place for vacating current premises
 - Council has discretion to approve later date



Recommendations Financial | Encumbrance

Proceeds from the future sale and development of the remainder of 688 Cambie

- Pay off the balance of the loan from Capital Financing Fund
- Remaining proceeds for parks and community facilities



Recommendations Governance | Gallery Board

The Gallery to continue as an arms length non-profit with an autonomous vision.

Mayor to participate as Honorary Board Member

Council to appoint up to two Board members

 Includes a representative on Finance & Audit Committee

Planning Considerations Future Use of Existing Gallery Facility

1913 Courthouse designed by Francis Rattenbury

Owned by Province, leased by City (99 years – 70 years left on lease)

Important social gathering place

Public concerns over future use

Council confirmed a desire to retain building for future cultural use

Downtown location important for organizations relying on tourism

Many organizations interested in space


