I am a resident of the seed of the seed of the seed of the seed of the proposed rezoning and development of 7249 Cypress St. I have noticed that there is increased car traffic in the 1800 block of W. 57th Ave. since the expansion of the Choices food store and the arrival and increase in popularity of Senova restaurant.

The immediate area - a formerly quiet residential neighborhood - is now frequently jammed up with cars looking for a place to park. It doesn't seem that anything has been done to accommodate the extra traffic. I usually park in the St. Faith's Church parking lot (now normally full as well) and don't feel safe crossing the street to go to Choices, which I do several times a week.

Btw, it does not seem that the condos built above this store a couple of years ago are in high demand. Most are unsold despite the constant presence of realtors and open houses. If they do become occupied, they will obviously add to the traffic problem.

We don't see the point of further saturating and compromising this attractive area, and strongly object to City Council's apparent goal of Marpolizing Kerrisdale.
