April 2012 – April 2013	Community Plan process
June 2013	DRAFT <i>Emerging Directions</i> released - <i>Some key concerns identified</i>
September 2013	Council extended the planning process
October 2013 – April 2014	Citizens' Assembly Terms of Reference developed; RFP process for consultant
June 2014	Citizens' Assembly recruitment
September 2014 - May 2015	Citizens' Assembly process - <i>11 full day sessions</i> - <i>3 public Roundtables</i> - <i>10 walking tours</i> - <i>7 Sub-area workshops with the public</i>

Citizens' Assembly – Process Overview

Three core components:

1. **Learning** – *about key topics and perspectives*
2. **Listening** – *to others and the broader community*
3. **Deliberating** – *weighing issues, assessing trade-offs and reaching recommendations*



Citizens' Assembly - Mandate & Deliverables

The Assembly produced:

- **Vision**
- **Community values**
- **Proposed land-use map**
- **Recommendations** and location-specific directions

Citizens' Assembly - Recommendations

To be incorporated into the Community Plan, recommendations have to be consistent with:

- City's planning principles
- Sound professional planning practices
- Established City policies
- Sound financial considerations
