

# Youth Homelessness and Challenges for Vulnerable Youth

City Response to the B.C. Representative for Children and Youth Report September 21, 2016



#### Council Motion - July 7, 2015



"Report back on progress to implement the BC Representative for Children and Youth recommendations of the Paige Report, and to create a Regional Youth Secretariat with the BC Government and Metro municipalities. Also that the BC Government should:

- a) Extend foster care to the age of 24, and end the practice of automatic aging out of the system
- b) Create a secure care system for vulnerable children and youth
- c) Add more Rapid Response capacity to ensure that action happens quickly when a child or youth is at serious risk
- d) Quickly adopt and implement all recommendations from the May 2015 report from the BC Representative for Children and Youth entitled Paige's Story."




#### Paige's Story Summary



The Children's Representative identified 30 actions and key messages, including:

- Need for urgent action across all orders of government and community to address gaps;
- No youth in care to live in SROs in the Downtown Eastside
- Concern about compliance with the duty to report among front line service providers and professionals
- Acknowledges the impacts of intergenerational trauma and residential schools



#### Paige's Story – 5 Actions Related to City




### The City is named in 5 of the 30 actions

- Has lead role in 2 actions:
- Coordinate regular inspections of SROs to ensure compliance
- Provide training to staff on Duty to Report
- Is involved in 3 actions lead by the Province:
- Conduct urgent review of the current provision of services
- Analyze numbers of children in care in and inventory service providers in the DTES
- Create and implement an action plan, including detailed public reporting on outcomes for children in the DTES

# Youth Homelessness – Overview and Contributing Factors







of youth experiencing homelessness self-identified as LGBTQ

#### **Contributing Factors Include:**

- Lack of Affordable and Accessible Housing
- Poverty
- Improper Discharge from Institutions
- Mental Health or Addiction issues
- Family Breakdown
- In one study, 45% of youth aging out of care indicated they were homeless at some point
- Only 10-20% of foster youth (aged 20-24) live with their foster parents or relatives
- By comparison, 60% of all 20-24 year olds live in parental homes

# Annual City Investments for Youth At Risk - \$4.33M

- City of Vancouver
   Social Grants for at risk child & youth services
   \$2.1M
- VPD 11 dedicated staff: child protection, sexual exploitation, probation and mental health \$1.7M
- Park Board Community Youth Workers \$0.5M
- Vancouver Public Library
   Teen Librarians \$0.33M

**TOTAL:** \$4.33 M



# Prevention & Support Services – Best Practice Examples Funded with CoV Social Grants



#### **Aunt Leah's** – Outreach & Support

- \$35,444 134 youth supported in 2015
- Evidence based programs supporting youth exiting care
  - Link Program home-based life skills and supports to assist youth find and maintain housing
  - Thresholds Program to provide wrap around supports for young mothers including post natal support and parenting skills

#### Lu'ma - Aboriginal Youth Mentorship & Housing

- \$20,000 25 youth supported in 2015
- Designed specifically for Aboriginal youth aging out of care
  - Mentoring one to one mentorship to support Aboriginal youth as they transition out of care
  - Ready to Rent builds skills in how to find and maintain housing
  - Life Skills focus on 12 key areas of personal development including goal setting, financial literacy and relationship building




# Aboriginal Mother's Centre

- \$30,000 400 people supported in 2015
- Supports to young Aboriginal Mothers and their children
  - Provides a holistic approach to health and wellness
  - Focus on building strong cultural connections, increasing self-esteem and developing skills in parenting and self care



15 % <= 24 years 32 homeless children (< 19 years of age)

- Province (BC Housing, Vancouver Coastal Health) requested capital and operating investment
- opportunity to engage with other partners, e.g.
   Streetohome and the Federal government

#### SRO Task Force (2016) Goals



- Address increasing crisis in SROs due to loss of affordability, poor condition and livability in private stock
- Bring together variety of stakeholders to listen, discuss and develop next steps in ongoing evolution of Council-supported SRO Strategy that is focused on improving affordability, condition and supports
- Build on existing initiatives and policies (SRA Bylaw, Integrated Enforcement, Rental Database, RTB Services, etc.)
- Provide input into "Housing Reset"

- 2. Continue to Work with Partners to secure commitment to Draft 3 year Shelter & Housing Investment Strategy
- 3. Support to Child, Youth and Family Innovation Hub involving co-location of 2 non-profits and MCFD at 2780 E. Broadway through building renovations and lease terms.
