Dear Mayor and Councillors,

I'm writing in support of the 1550 Alberni project because of its contribution to Vancouver's architectural diversity, its seamless integration of the built environment and nature, and the transformative experience it would bring to our community.

I recently visited NYC and stayed near the Highline Park, an urban renewal project that breaths new life into the Meat Packing District. During my morning runs, I found myself missing the backdrop of our North Shore mountains and the cool forest air along the seawall. I also found that I paused frequently, either because I was awed by the scale of the Hudson Yards development, mesmerized by the furturistic façade of Zaha Hadid's last project in New York, or amused by the life-like, hyperrealistic Sleepwalker sculpture. Each piece of architecture and public art connects with passersby like me in its unique and authentic way. Collectively, they create the kind of cultural vitality and architectural diversity that I think is much needed in Vancouver. The 1550 Alberni project, with its carved, sculptural form, sensitivity to materials and craftsmanship, and air of serenity, would gift the architectural sparks that many Vancouverites desire. As a young professional who lives and works downtown, I share the sentiment that we don't need another bunch of safe deposit boxes in the sky, or one more concrete and glass tower that amplifies isolation. We crave a masterful piece of architecture that connects community and nature, and evoke moments of wonder and warmth amid the sea of green glass and grey sky.

I would also like to applaud this project for its implicit sustainability impact, not in a conventional sense, i.e. carbon neutral construction material, district energy system and high-performance glazing system. Those are all important aspects of sustainability. But I think there's also a deeper, underrated aspect of sustainability that's rooted in our connection to beauty and craftsmanship. The kind of timeless connection that is so rare in an age of massive consumption of objects, spaces, and relationships. Creating a project like 1550 Alberni that would have the cultural and emotional presence that stands the test of time, and would continue to inspire and never be demolished, is one of the most sustainable endeavours that a city builder could undertake.

I support this project wholeheartedly. Thank you for your time.

Dear Mayor Robertson and Councillors,

I live and work in downtown Vancouver and I am in support of the project at 1550 Alberni.

The late Bing Thom had aptly described Vancouver as an "adolescent" city – one that doesn't know what it wants to be when it grows up, but one with tremendous potential. Tremendous promise.

That promise was dense, vibrant, urban living in a built environment as distinct and beautiful as its natural surroundings. The potential was in the prospect of 1 million new residents over the next 25 years, and with all the talent and opportunity they bring.

These recent years have been disappointing, however, as we've seen so much resistance to even the most modest of improvements and progress. But every once in a while a project like this comes along, a project that pushes Vancouver toward meeting its potential. A project that helps the city grow up. A project that gives the city something thoughtful, distinct and beautiful. A worthwhile use of our precious limited space.

What we're getting at 1550 Alberni is no less than a work of art. A delicate masterpiece that, along with Vancouver House, and others will help put Vancouver on the architectural map, as well as improve the public realm.

But perhaps even more important than what the skyline gets are the spillover benefits, namely the \$32 million the city will get for community amenities, including over \$21 million right back in the West End. That's money for the things we need more of: day cares, community centres, libraries, places for non-profit groups to operate to fulfill their social purpose. That's money for community spaces that are steadily disappearing. That's money for spaces that doesn't need to come from us taxpayers.

Now some people may have their concerns, as is their right:

- They may say that it's too much density but with density comes activity, vitality and opportunity; more people to attract and justify the things that make city life nicer...
- They may complain about traffic but why should we expect suburban-style car-friendliness downtown?
- They may complain that their views are blocked but blocked by what? A work of architectural art? In most places, they would call this a "city view" and you'd pay extra for that..

• They may complain that the units are too expensive – granted these family-sized units probably will be expensive for a lot of us - they're definitely not starter homes. But these homes divert richer people out of my market space.

Despite these concerns, this project, and those like it, advance us as a city. They are important to us fulfilling our potential, our destiny. We will all benefit from this project, even if we don't live in it. So I ask you to please help continue to move this city forward by approving this project.
