To Mayor and Council:

In advance of Public Hearing for the 105 Keefer rezoning application commencing May 23rd at City Hall, I am writing to reiterate our position of non-support. This is following previous letters we have written, and in our position as a member organization of the Chinese Benevolent Association that has written on our behalf previously in unanimous unsupport.

Our society owns and operates property including storefront and second floor office rental units at 434, 436, 438 and 440 along Main Street in Chinatown. Our society has been in operation for 93 years. We continue to contribute to the Chinatown and Vancouver community through a lion dance team that performs in the Chinese New Year parade and Canada Day celebrations in Chinatown each year, Scholarship Program, as well as various committees and a broad membership that continue to practice the traditions and rituals that define Chinatown's intangible cultural heritage.

The Historic Area Height Review (2010) has already accommodated height increase allowance from 75 feet to 90 feet for new development within Chinatown HA-1A, for the purpose of encouraging community benefit in the form of new economic investment.

We feel that the current zoning for 90 feet development at the extremely sensitive and culturally significant site of 105 Keefer and 544 Columbia Streets is sufficient.

We therefore maintain our original position of non-support for the proposal.

Dear Mayor Robertson and Vancouver City

Council,

I am writing this email to express my concerns about the 105 Keefer St and 544 Columbia St application. Chinatown is a special part of my Vancouver. I grew up with stories of the history of Chinatown, how it came to be and the many lives of the pioneers who worked, loved, lived and suffered there. Chinatown is an important part of the history of Vancouver! It is also a testament to the people who endured hardship, racism, and violence in order to retain their humanity in a City which did not welcome them except as labourers. I also experienced the joy of many wonderful diners in this area and a sense of community and caring that went with it.

I urge you to not approve the rezoning application for the following reasons: - It will displace low income residents

economically.

- It will raise commercial lease prices and price affordable businesses out of Chinatown.
- This is a critical site in a historic area. It should not be used for market condos.
- The seniors housing units being proposed in this project is not enough to warrant extra density.
- Approval of this project despite community opposition will mean the City does not value Chinatown as a historic neighbourhood.
- It is inappropriate to build luxury condos next to the memorial statue.
- We should not be displacing those seniors or aspects of Asian/Chinese cultural for financial gain. We need to maintain this area as our historical remembrance of those who survived riots and poverty and still made a community. Not bulldoze it like we did Hogan's Alley and displace it's citizens and culture.

Instead of market condos, I would like suggest the following alternatives for the site:

- Affordable housing for seniors
- An intergeneration space
- A green space
- Smaller buildings that make more sense in the fabric of Chinatown
- Something that compliments the sites which are already there.

This rezoning application should not be approved because of the reasons I have listed above. Listen to the citizens instead of the development community. The spirit of Chinatown, its' history and community members should be recognized and maintained. Do not let this special place in Vancouver fall victim to a rapaciousness that ignores history and community.

The controversial Chinatown condo tower rezoning at 105 Keefer St., beside the Dr. Sun Yat-sen Garden, is going to a public hearing on May 23. It continues to be strongly opposed since 2014.

The Chinatown Historic Area Planning Committee (CHAPC), a city council-appointed group, voted against the proposal again in January, stating that their previous concerns had not been addressed. These concerns included excessive height and density, livability of units, quality and types of community amenity spaces in the building, and a richer mix of uses required.

CHAPC noted that "the proposal does not fully recognize the sensitivity of the site in relation to the Heritage Area, Memorial Square, Dr. Sun Yat-sen Garden, and the nearby museum."

The proposal is 12 storeys with commercial space, 106 condo units and 25 social housing units. It has 75 per cent non-support in city consultation, yet the city continues to push through essentially the same design.

Helen Lee, an urban planner and chair of CHAPC, confirms that the current report still doesn't address the group's concerns. Lee says "each revised version provides only minor tweaks mainly focused on the architectural design elements rather than the more important issues of bulk and height. The proposal is too much for this very important site in the heart of Chinatown."

These huge increases in height and density are proposed in exchange for only 25 units of so-called "social housing" that are in fact mostly market rentals that B.C. Housing will buy from the developer for

\$7.3 million. Hardly a public benefit, yet it also means waiving of development cost levies. The developer, Beedie Group, are large donors to the B.C. Liberals.

The late architect Joe Wai fought to save Chinatown from the freeway and urban renewal in 1971. He went on to design many Chinatown landmarks, including the garden and museum.

"As it is now clear that we don't want what is being built, the 105 Keefer Street rezoning becomes the 'line in the sand' if we, Vancouver (not just little Chinatown), would like some form of character as a city, besides the God-given mountains and inlets," Wai said.

Former premier Mike Harcourt said Vancouver's historic Chinatown is "teetering on the brink" and this one huge bulky building is causing particular alarm since the high-end condominium proposal would tower over the area.

"Development should re-energize and revitalize Chinatown, but not overwhelm it. This building dwarfs all of the heritage buildings of the Chinese community along Pender Street and it's just too much," Harcourt said.

Chinatown was given a National Historic Site of Canada designation in 2011. It is one of the largest Chinatowns in North America. However, the designated area only covers a portion of Chinatown on Pender Street from the Millennium Gate to Gore Ave. while providing no actual protection. The city's land use policies determine what is built.

A number of city planning initiatives undermine Chinatown's heritage character: from EcoDensity in 2007, the Heritage Area Height Review in 2008-09, the Downtown Eastside Local Area Plan of 2011-14, and changes to the transfer of density policy that now allows bonus density to be landed into Chinatown.

Vancouver's Chinatown is now on Canada's top-10 endangered list.

Most of Chinatown has now been opened up to large-scale tower development that is not sympathetic to the traditional architecture of two to four storeys and maximum height of 50 feet. It now allows tower heights of up to 150 feet, with two recent rezonings on Main Street even higher at 16 to 18 storeys.

Wai stated: "It all comes down to the demolition of a Historic District ... erosion of local small retails such as those long-standing barbecue meat shops and barber shops. ... If the height is double or more than the traditional 50 feet high, the density and bulk will transform the character and Chinatown will become unrecognizable. The freeway debates (1966-74) have de facto re-surfaced."

The area zoning is being reviewed, but it will come too late for current proposals underway like 105 Keefer Street. The city has not used common practise to have an interim rezoning policy that restricts rezoning until the new zoning changes are in place.

The recent plaque-unveiling ceremony for Chinatown's historic designation was followed by a banquet for 460 people to celebrate the event, including the Mayor, councillors, civic officials, and both federal and provincial representatives.

Fred Mah, the organizing committee chair, presented at the banquet that 105 Keefer is too tall, too big and not the right fit for Chinatown's character. He urged everyone to come out to speak at the public hearing on May 23.

Mah expressed frustration that the lead city planners involved don't seem to understand heritage zoning or care about Chinatown.

Heritage or character zoning requires a fine-tuned balance that makes the retention of existing character buildings of greater economic benefit than for demolition. New development should fit within the historic context. It requires specialized planning staff who appreciate heritage zoning.

This has been evident in other areas across the city as well. For example, in the heritage area of Grandview the city is now drafting zoning bylaws for the duplex RT zones. Current drafts demonstrate a complete disregard for the economics of character retention and instead add more advantages to demolition with no character design guidelines.

It is the same lead planner, Paul Cheng, for Chinatown and Grandview. Although he is running into problems in these two heritage area rezonings, he did well in the Norquay plan because it was not a character historic area. After a revolving door of planning teams in Norquay, Cheng was a good fit there and got things done. But these heritage areas are different and Cheng keeps bringing back proposals that don't work.

Further complicating this is that staff have indicated that the Grandview duplex RT zone may be used in the RS zones across the city as part of the character home rezoning review.

So a lead planner, who doesn't support heritage, is in charge of drafting zoning bylaws for heritage areas such as Chinatown, Grandview and character housing zones. No wonder this is not working. Is the city's real agenda to eliminate heritage districts entirely?

Fourth Rezoning Application of 105 Keefer Street and 544 Columbia Street Re:

Dear Urban Design Panel Chair and members:

This fourth rezoning application of the 105 Keefer Street project in the HA-1A zone contains the same issues as the last applications; that is, the neglect of real response to community concerns. Simply put, is the height, bulk and very nominal allowance for community use.

- 1. The Chinatown Memorial Plaza was very minimally revised and not sufficient for the community purpose of its existence;
- 2. With no current FSR limitation in HA-1A, height is the critical guideline for density. The City of Vancouver Council's 2010 resolution was very specific about the limitation of height. Although the height has been slightly reduced to 115 ft., the subsequent "revision" did not get wide, nor particular notification. The allowable discretionary height above 90 ft. to a maximum of 120 ft. was intended for the south side of Keefer Street.
- 3. The seniors housing has remained at 25 units without a specific indication of whether they are being sold to BC Housing (since being declined by a non-profit group) for the core-needy or "affordable rental".

I trust that you will consider the issues above when reviewing the application and make the right decision. Chinatown requires your leadership to ensure that development, such as this application, in this crucial historic area serve to build communities first and not just to maximize profit.

I have concerns about the 105 Keefer X 544 Columbia St rezoning application and I am writing because I am opposed to this rezoning application.

I grew up in Vancouver going to Chinatown as a child. Chinatown is a special part of my Vancouver. I go to Chinatown at least once a week for shopping, dining or leisure events. I am a member of the Dr. Sun Yat-Sen Classical Garden and the Chinese Canadian Military Museum. Although currently no direct family members reside in Chinatown, my mum and dad, uncles and aunts, cousins, Grandpa and Grandmas all lived in Chinatown at one time. They went to school, grew up, and worked there and even after they moved away to live in other parts of the City, they continued to come to Chinatown to spend their time as I do now, visiting friends/family, shopping, dining and attending social events.

Council and staff should not approve the application for the following reasons:

- Taxpayers should not be funding Beedie's profit. We are funding the social housing that they are using to justify the increase in height and density. They are not paying any CAC and got a discounted DCL. This is not right.
- It will economically displace vulnerable seniors in Chinatown.
- This project will result in increased property taxes that mom and pop stores cannot afford.
- Putting a building with million dollar homes on that site right next to the memorial plaza is not appropriate in Chinatown.
- The height of this building is too tall relative to the surrounding historic buildings .
- The mass of this building is too large and unfit for the area.
- The proposed building was not supported by the Chinatown Historic Area Planning Committee, comprised of diverse community representatives.
- The seniors housing units being proposed in this project is not enough to warrant extra density.
- This will set a bad precedent for the all rezonings in Chinatown.
- Our veterans did not fight wars to have their memorial treated as a private yard for condo owners.

Given that Vancouver's Chinatown has been designated a National Historical Site, allowing this 12 storey mixed-use building to be built in the heart of Vancouver Chinatown is unacceptable. Such a development would not be allowed in other cities with neighborhoods that have been designated as National Historical Sites such as Winnipeg (Exchange District) and Montreal (Old Montreal). Furthermore, based on Council's definition of "social housing" and the developer's claims that the proposed re-zoning will support and advance the objectives of the Housing and Homeless Strategy by including "25 social-housing units," it is not clear nor certain to the extent to which the proposed development of 105 Keefer will realize these objectives nor how the of Vancouver Chinatown and other City of Vancouver taxpayers will benefit from this proposed new development and re-zoning.

Here are some of my ideas of what could be on the 105 Keefer site instead of condos:

- More seniors housing and social housing
- A plaza for the community
- A space for all ages
- More green space
- Fine-grain buildings that are broken up on the lot

I do not believe that this rezoning proposal is appropriate for the neighbourhood. Therefore, I urge the Mayor and council to reject this application.

To Vancouver City Council:

I am writing to you regarding my non-support for the 105 Keefer St and 544 Columbia St application. I previously lived in the Chinatown neighbourhood. Chinatown was where I grew up. Chinatown is a special part of my Vancouver. My relationship to Chinatown is instrinsic to my identity as a Chinese Canadian. I grew up visiting Chinatown weekly with family members and friends. My cousins were raised in Chinatown- attending Strathcona elementary, doing homework at the Fairchild radio station where their parents worked, and learning Cantonese in the Mon Keang school room. Chinatown is not simply a token landmark that signifies Vancouver's multicultural historic past, it is still a thriving, living community that struggles to preserve its cultural relevance in the face of intense socioeconomic pressures.

I am opposed to the proposal for the building for these reasons:

- It is not right that taxpayers are paying for the social housing so that Beedie can profit from the rezoning's height and density increases. They are also paying reduced DCL and no CACs. This is not fair.
- Low-income residents, especially seniors, will be priced out of Chinatown.
- It will raise commercial lease prices and price affordable businesses out of Chinatown.
- Putting a building with million dollar homes on that site right next to the memorial plaza is not appropriate in Chinatown.
- It is too tall at least four times the average building height of surrounding buildings.
- The mass of this building is too large and unfit for the area.

- There is insufficient seniors housing.
- Approving this rezoning will set poor precedent to other rezonings in Chinatown.
- Building luxury condos next to the memorial statue is to dishonour the contributions of our Chinese-Canadian veterans and railway workers who helped build this city and country.
- More families are needed in Chinatown, not single yuppies like what the applicant is proposing.
- The new development will significantly dictate the fate of economic trends in Vancouver. If Beedie is successful, this will give way to other development projects that may also counter the health of other marginalized communities- it will set a precedent that declares that the municipal government does not care about the welfare of long-time, permanent Vancouver residents, instead favouring projects that provide temporary economic satisfaction. If the Beedie proposal passes, this action will send the message to the people of Vancouver that the city is not concerned with the Chinese, elderly, and/or low-income residents. The city has an existing reputation for being unaffordable throughout Canada and internationally- does the council also want Vancouver to be synonymous with being an exclusive, culturally homogenous, and profit-driven city?

Here are some of my ideas of what could be on the 105 Keefer site instead of condos:

- Significantly more social housing
- Community centre
- All ages community facillity

- A park

- Fine-grain buildings that are broken up on the lot

- Vancouver's Chinatown has an enduring impression on people who have visited, yet the livelihood and history of the community is disintegrating. Toronto is known for a Chinese Canadian library. It is about time that a Chinese cultural site, similar to Nikkei National Museum and Cultural Centre (in Burnaby), was set up in the heart of Chinatown, 105 Keefer. Many of the clan buildings in Chinatown are run by volunteers who have a plethora of important historical documentation that they struggle to preserve. If Chinatown had a place to archive and display these documents, that would be ideal. Why not keep these important artifacts where they belong? In the heart of the community.

In conclusion, this proposal is not good for the neighbourhood. Council should not approve it.

Dear city council,

I am writing to you with regards to the Rezoning proposal for 105 Keefer St. Currently, I live near Chinatown, where the 105 Keefer site is. I also work in the neighbourhood. The historic area has special significance to my upbringing, and as a result is a special part of the city for me as a citizen.

My connection to Chinatown is cultural, social, political, and economic. For example, Chinatown is where I am able to access certain types and qualities of food and foodways. And although Chinatown is not the exclusive location for such ingredients, it is important to note that I come to Chinatown because I am connected to it beyond business choices. My connection even extends beyond social choices, such as my active choice to visit Chinatown to visit my close friends, interact with its locals, and work. I come here because my value system includes things like supporting small and local businesses, acknowledging and respecting the organic growth and development of a neighbourhood (as opposed to development that occurs at the expense of—and without the full consent of—a living community), nurturing and interacting with tangible and intangible heritage, and addressing the needs of a community and neighbourhood so that it can grow with the right to health, dignity, and equity.

Additionally, I am concerned with broader topics around gentrification, racialization as it affects the perceived value of a neigbourhood's heritage, and the lack of consent between Beedie Developers and the people that 105 Keefer would displace. Thus 105 Keefer concerns me because it is a site where all of these issues intertwine to create a case where the approval of this project would mean a powerful precedent for mass rezoning at unsustainable, unmanageable paces. The people who live and work there now are not merely part of a dying history; they are living, and have explicitly made their needs and wishes known time and time again.

I do not support the proposed rezoning because of the following:

- It is not right that taxpayers are paying for the social housing so that Beedie can profit from the rezoning's height and density increases. They are also paying reduced DCL and no CACs. This is not fair.
- Like the retail businesses in recent developments, the retail units in this project will be unaffordable to seniors.
- It will price out affordable local businesses.
- Luxury condos are not an appropriate use of this culturally sensitive site.
- It is completely out of proportion. The average building around the area is two to three storeys tall and this one is twelve.
- The building proposed is out of scale with immediate surroundings.
- Members of the Chinatown Historic Planning Committee voted against this project.
- The seniors housing being offered in this project is discouraging.
- Approval of this project will result in developments like this becoming the norm in Chinatown, ignoring the fact that it is a historic neighbourhood.

Furthermore, I am concerned that 105 Keefer fails to address the urgent and long-term needs of the community that lives, works, or otherwise resides in and around Chinatown. Such needs include the right to shelter and safe

homes for the homeless/houseless/low-income. In this case, projects like 105 Keefer take up space that could be used for social housing or public community use. Any economic income that might be generated from the project would not truly benefit the community, as it would directly contribute to the direct and immediate displacement of people who face intersections of race, class, ability, and physical/mental health. This displacement is economic, social, and, arguably, cultural: Economic, because it raises the cost of living in the neighbourhood for low-income folks in the neighbourhood, possibly to the point of pushing them out of the area and into even more unaffordable areas; Social, because it pushes people out of the spaces where they have built communities and complex networks/systems of food sharing, business, and a way of life; Cultural, because 105 Keefer has been opposed by a vast number of people with knowledge, lived experience, and research on the culturally-specific histories of life and intangible/tangible heritage(s) of the neighbourhood.

Here are some of my ideas of what could be on the 105 Keefer site instead of condos:

- More social housing (this means housing with prices that are scaled to welfare and low-income rates of those in the neighbourhood, NOT market housing rates)
- Centre for the community
- A space for all ages, incomes
- More public space for cultural sharing and gathering.

The 105 Keefer rezoning application is not suitable for Chinatown. Staff should address the citizens' discontent with this project, and should not recommend City Council to approve it.

To Mayor and Council:

I am writing this email to express my concerns about the 105 Keefer proposal. I have lived in Vancouver for over 40 years and highly value the heritage aspect of Chinatown's wonderful buildings and the cultural elements of the community. I have co-produced an annual event in partnership with the Dr. Sun Yat-Sen Classical Chinese Garden for the past 18 years and have come to know and appreciate the local community.

I am strongly opposed to the building proposed for the following reasons:

- Beedie is not providing meaningful community benefits to warrant rezoning.

- The developer should not be granted additional height and density as it is funded by taxpayers like me, and their proposed "social housing" is inadequate.

- It will price low-income local residents out of the neighbourhood.

- This project will result in significant tax increases which local and historic family-owned businesses cannot afford.

- The Keefer Triangle is a culturally significant site that should not be used for condos.

- It is more massive, high and dense than all the buildings next to it.

- It was rejected by the City of Vancouver Chinatown Historic Area Planning Committee.

- The number of seniors housing units being offered is entirely inadequate.

- This will set a bad precedent for future rezoning in Chinatown.

- The development will result in a drastic reduction of family units.

Not only do luxury condo developments fail to address Vancouver's urgent housing crisis, they increase the divide between the "haves" and have-nots" and hasten displacement of long-term local residents who have no other options for housing, whereas those wealthy enough to afford the proposed condos have numerous options.

There is a widespread perception that the current Council rolls out the red carpet for developers while simultaneously expressing an interest in ending homelessness. This dichotomy is rapidly eroding trust in Council, and that lack of public trust and support endangers Council's ability to be effective in other areas.

Vancouver has already lost much of it's character to rampant real estate speculation and we simply cannot afford to lose any more. Chinatown has evolved over the course of generations and its' hardwon character must not be destroyed for a quick cash grab. I value our City's heritage and believe that Chinatown must be preserved and cherished.

Instead of luxury condos the 105 Keefer site could better be used for much-needed social housing for seniors and families, and for a community centre or green space to serve the neighbourhood while preserving the historic character of the area.

Dear Mayor and Council:

I am writing to urge you to reject the 105 Keefer rezoning application. I am a resident and a renter in Vancouver nearby Chinatown.

You should reject the application because:

- 1. The applicant has not produced any recognized non-mandatory public benefits for the additional height requested (see page 90 'Public Benefits Summary' of the Staff Report to Council). The social housing in the proposal is 100% paid for by the taxpayers via the provincial government, not the applicant. Thus, the applicant has provided no additional public benefits value in exchange for the three additional floors of million dollar glass penthouses proposed for 105 Keefer.
- 2. As a renter in Vancouver, housing affordability is a key issue for me. The new housing units at 105 Keefer will be unaffordable for locals. For example, it is highly unlikely that I will be able to afford to rent or purchase the units at 105 Keefer, let alone low income Chinese seniors on welfare or pension who will not even be able to afford the majority of the social housing proposed.

To give you a sense of the lack of affordability that the new housing stock in Chinatown brings, here are some rental rates of units in the surrounding buildings in the neighbourhood:

There are also many more listings on Airbnb. Again, we need affordable housing that serves locals, not housing stock that serves as short-term investment instruments.

As it stands, market and luxury condos at 105 Keefer will not create a more livable, affordable, inclusive and compassionate city for all, but a city for the few who can afford it. 105 Keefer will only serve to accelerate gentrification that is masked as "economic revitalization" by bringing gentry to Chinatown that isolates and displaces. The negatives of bringing more luxury housing stock online in a vulnerable neighbourhood is much greater than the minor benefits that the few units of accompanying social housing might bring. Ultimately, projects like 105 Keefer are not creating a healthy city. Therefore, I strongly recommend that you reject this rezoning application.

As a child, my grandparents took my cousins and I to Floata Restaurant for dim sum every Saturday. We would enjoy the buffet style ordering before 11am. Afterwards, my grandma would go grocery shopping for the family dinner later that night while my grandpa brought us to Andy Livingstone Park. I remember splashing and running through the water on a hot summer's day. This park was one of my best memories of childhood. Other weeks my grandpa would visit his good friend and barber at his tiny shopfront on the corner of Hastings and Princess Ave. We stayed in the van and played amongst ourselves. We were a group of 5 cousins so we played forts. Every year, we packed the streets in our bright new clothing for the Chinese New Year parade. My wife and I immigrated from France in 2008 and have called Strathcona home since 2012. We view Chinatown as the heart of Vancouver and would like to ensure our two young children can always enjoy its vibrancy and uniqueness. A large part of why we chose Vancouver as our adopted home was my fascination with its Chinatown, which feels so rich and real compared to the newer parts of the city.

I am the founder of a local website called Chinatown Today. Over the last couple of years, this passion project allowed me to connect to my community. As far as I understand, this community has working-class roots and is in dire need of affordable homes, culturally appropriate food supply, and respect for its isolated elders.

Having kept a close eye on the proposal for 105 Keefer, I never saw any indication that the Beedie Group cared about any of these issues. I grew up in Chinatown and now as an adult, I volunteer as a Director with the Chau Luen Society, to ensure affordable low income housing for seniors in Chinatown and also lead the athletic club, meeting twice weekly, advocating Chinese culture to the next generation of youths in the area. Professionally, I work in the growing technology industry our city supports. I am the Director of Finance at Unbounce, and was previously the Financial Controller for Hootsuite.

Chinatown has been a part of me, my entire life. When my parents first immigrated to Canada from Hoy Ping Province, China, in 1983, we lived in a tiny, studio apartment in the heart of Chinatown, at Pender and Columbia. With 2 parents, 4 children (aged 0-10), privacy was afforded via thin fabric, thrown over haphazardly hung string.

My parents worked long hours, rising early and coming home late. My mother worked at the fishery, gutting fish, and my father a labourer at a grocer. My Grand Aunt would babysit us while my parents worked. She lived in Chinatown, at the Chau Luen Tower; housing laid out for low income seniors.

Mayor Robertson recently visited Chau Luen Tower as part of his outreach initiatives and as I understand it, the recognition of the importance that affordable housing for seniors is to the Mayor and Council. I believe that the proposed development at 105 Keefer St stands in direct opposition to ensuring affordable housing for seniors in Chinatown.

I am very concerned about the building proposed because:

- Luxury condos are not an appropriate use of this culturally sensitive site.
- The height of this building is too tall relative to the surrounding historic buildings .

Dear Mayor & Council and Planning Department staff,

I am writing a letter of opposition to the rezoning application at 105 Keefer Street/544 Columbia Street.

I strongly believe that this rezoning, if passed, will negatively impact this historic community. After graduating from UBC in 2015, I've been working in Chinatown and interact with many merchants and others in the community on a daily basis. Because I grew up attending Chinese school near Strathcona five days a week, I am fortunate enough to communicate with people in the neighbourhood in both english, cantonese, and mandarin fluently. I know that the promise of "densification with economic revitalization" has fallen drastically short, and I believe that there is a better way to develop this community to be thriving and vibrant, but still inclusive and affordable.

We should be developing Chinatown with its existing assets in mind, and form policies that will elevate those qualities to attract newcomers to the neighbourhood. The newcomers don't have to be residents - they can be workers or shoppers. Those would be the types of people who can help to form and build a community. Chinatown is one of the few places in Vancouver where I still feel that people care about their neighbours and are not driven by profit and self-interest. These are important qualities to respect and preserve. I hope more people, especially younger generations, can share my experience of getting to know local shop owners and supporting their independent businesses in a small way.

We need more housing in Vancouver, but the heart of Chinatown is not the most appropriate place to densify.

I urge you to reject this rezoning application.

Dear City Council:

I am writing to express my strong opposition to the proposed high-rise development to rezone 105 Keefer Street into a mixed use 12 story building as it will negatively affect the entire Chinatown neighbourhood and provide very little benefit to the community.

My parents immigrated to Canada in the early 1960's and settled in nearby Strathcona. As a child, I enjoyed our journey to Chinatown to shop at the local stores and take in the unique, authentic culture of the neighbourhood. As an adult, I still enjoy shopping in Chinatown, visiting the Chinese Cultural Museum and Dr. Sun Yat-Sen Classical Garden, and attending events like the annual Chinese New Year Parade and Chinatown Festival. Seeing Chinatown turn into a soulless area with glass towers and chain stores everywhere saddens me.

The area is a national treasure and must be protected. The Beedie development is situated very close to culturally significant sites including the Chinatown Memorial Square which contains the Chinese Canadian railroad workers and WWII Veterans monuments, the Chinese Cultural Centre, and Dr. Sun Yat-Sen Classical Chinese Garden. In addition, Vancouver's Chinatown was designated as a National Heritage Site in 2014. This area contains many important heritage buildings such as the Chinese Benevolent Association and the Chinese Freemasons. In 2016, the National Trust of Canada placed Vancouver's Chinatown as #2 on their Top 10 Most Endangered National Sites list. It is also #3 on Heritage Vancouver's Top 10 watch list of endangered sites.

This development will decrease housing affordability by establishing higher residential and commercial rents and home prices in the area which will accelerate the displacement of the neighbourhood's most vulnerable residents and small traditional businesses. Many seniors have lived in this area for their entire lives, and if they are forced to move from this community, it will result in a deep cultural loss for this city.

While well over 100 market rate dwelling units will be created in the Beedie development, only 25 social housing units are planned, and of these 70% are permitted to be rented out at market rates. The developer Beedie reaps all the benefits but does not contribute anything towards social housing as the entire cost is covered by taxpayers via BC Housing. The developer is also exempt from providing any public benefits as they do not have to pay Development Cost Levies or provide any Community Amenity Contributions, so public

benefits such as child care, cultural facilities, green transportation, parks, public spaces, and supportive & senior housing must be borne by the government. How is this fair to the citizens that are being displaced or to the taxpayers?

Instead of listening to the developers, the City of Vancouver needs to actually listen to the people who live in this community to see what their needs are and implement the policies put forward by Chinatown residents including the recommendations of the Chinatown Concern Group.

A luxury market development tower at 115 feet at this site would disrespect Chinatown's distinct character and is a slap in the face to all the Chinese immigrants who came to Canada a century ago to make BC their home.

The majority of Vancouverites are against this development. A petition circulated by the Chinatown Concern Group has garnered over 1400 signatures. Over 75% of the comments submitted throughout the community consultation (since Beedie's original September 2014 application) are in opposition to this rezoning application. The City of Vancouver's own policy report on this development (April 8, 2017) demonstrates more examples of public opposition than support.

I ask that you please do not allow the Beedie development tower in Chinatown and instead enact a moratorium on future market-rate development. The City's focus should be on improving affordable and social housing in this area, especially for low income seniors. Also please designate all of Chinatown as a Heritage Conservation area and work with the provincial and federal governments to purchase the space at 105 Keefer Street to provide an inter-generational, multi-use community space for the neighbourhood. Chain stores (such as Starbucks) should not be allowed to preserve the unique character of Chinatown.

We have all seen the devastating effects gentrification has had on the Downtown Eastside and other areas in Metro Vancouver. Please don't let Chinatown lose its unique social and cultural character by allowing market-rate development. Please turn down the proposed Beedie development tower. Thank you.

I wish to express my opinion on this development application.

I have worked in the neighbourhood the last seven years. I also have memories of Chinatown from my childhood when I would accompany my Chinese grandmother to her weekly Mah Jong games.

I returned to Chinatown 7 years ago and was shocked to see how much the vibrancy and fabric of the area had disappeared. I realize the neighbhourhood's fortunes have been complicated by the problems in the Downtown Eastside. And I realize Chinatown is very central and the empty lots or disintegrating buildings are a prime opportunity for redevelopment.

However, I am eager to see Chinatown character -- both in architecture and in culture -- preserved. All neighbourhoods are unique. But in Vancouver, Chinatown is particularly special for its architecture and history. Only our City Council can ensure that new developments reflect the character and the needs of the community.

As someone who works in Vancouver and who still pays property taxes in Vancouver (I own a condo on Heather Street) I would ask you to consider my objections to this development on the basis that:

The controversial Chinatown condo tower rezoning at 105 Keefer St., beside the Dr. Sun Yat-sen Garden, is going to a public hearing on May 23. It continues to be strongly opposed since 2014.

The Chinatown Historic Area Planning Committee (CHAPC), a city council-appointed group, voted against the proposal again in January, stating that their previous concerns had not been addressed. These concerns included excessive height and density, livability of units, quality and types of community amenity spaces in the building, and a richer mix of uses required.

CHAPC noted that "the proposal does not fully recognize the sensitivity of the site in relation to the Heritage Area, Memorial Square, Dr. Sun Yat-sen Garden, and the nearby museum."

The proposal is 12 storeys with commercial space, 106 condo units and 25 social housing units. It has 75 per cent non-support in city consultation, yet the city continues to push through essentially the same design.

Helen Lee, an urban planner and chair of CHAPC, confirms that the current report still doesn't address the group's concerns. Lee says "each revised version provides only minor tweaks mainly focused on the architectural design elements rather than the more important issues of bulk and height. The proposal is too much for this very important site in the heart of Chinatown."

These huge increases in height and density are proposed in exchange for only 25 units of so-called "social housing" that are in fact mostly market rentals that B.C. Housing will buy from the developer for \$7.3 million. Hardly a public benefit, yet it also means waiving of development cost levies. The developer, Beedie Group, are large donors to the B.C. Liberals.

The late architect Joe Wai fought to save Chinatown from the freeway and urban renewal in 1971. He went on to design many Chinatown landmarks, including the garden and museum.

"As it is now clear that we don't want what is being built, the 105 Keefer Street rezoning becomes the 'line in the sand' if we, Vancouver (not just little Chinatown), would like some form of character as a city, besides the God-given mountains and inlets," Wai said.

Former premier Mike Harcourt said Vancouver's historic Chinatown is "teetering on the brink" and this one huge bulky building is causing particular alarm since the high-end condominium proposal would tower over the area.

"Development should re-energize and revitalize Chinatown, but not overwhelm it. This building dwarfs all of the heritage buildings of the Chinese community along Pender Street and it's just too much," Harcourt said.

Chinatown was given a National Historic Site of Canada designation in 2011. It is one of the largest Chinatowns in North America. However, the designated area only covers a portion of Chinatown on Pender Street from the Millennium Gate to Gore Ave. while providing no actual protection. The city's land use policies determine what is built.

A number of city planning initiatives undermine Chinatown's heritage character: from EcoDensity in 2007, the Heritage Area Height Review in 2008-09, the Downtown Eastside Local Area Plan of 2011-14, and changes to the transfer of density policy that now allows bonus density to be landed into Chinatown.

Vancouver's Chinatown is now on Canada's top-10 endangered list.

Most of Chinatown has now been opened up to large-scale tower development that is not sympathetic to the traditional architecture of two to four storeys and maximum height of 50 feet. It now allows tower heights of up to 150 feet, with two recent rezonings on Main Street even higher at 16 to 18 storeys.

Wai stated: "It all comes down to the demolition of a Historic District ... erosion of local small retails such as those long-standing barbecue meat shops and barber shops. ... If the height is double or more than the traditional 50 feet high, the density and bulk will transform the character and Chinatown will become unrecognizable. The freeway debates (1966-74) have de facto re-surfaced."

The area zoning is being reviewed, but it will come too late for current proposals underway like 105 Keefer Street. The city has not used common practise to have an interim rezoning policy that restricts rezoning until the new zoning changes are in place.

The recent plaque-unveiling ceremony for Chinatown's historic designation was followed by a banquet for 460 people to celebrate the event, including the Mayor, councillors, civic officials, and both federal and provincial representatives.

Fred Mah, the organizing committee chair, presented at the banquet that 105 Keefer is too tall, too big and not the right fit for Chinatown's character. He urged everyone to come out to speak at the public hearing on May 23.

Mah expressed frustration that the lead city planners involved don't seem to understand heritage zoning or care about Chinatown.

Heritage or character zoning requires a fine-tuned balance that makes the retention of existing character buildings of greater economic benefit than for demolition. New development should fit within the historic context. It requires specialized planning staff who appreciate heritage zoning.

This has been evident in other areas across the city as well. For example, in the heritage area of Grandview the city is now drafting zoning bylaws for the duplex RT zones. Current drafts demonstrate a complete disregard for the economics of character retention and instead add more advantages to demolition with no character design guidelines.

It is the same lead planner, Paul Cheng, for Chinatown and Grandview. Although he is running into problems in these two heritage area rezonings, he did well in the Norquay plan because it was not a character historic area. After a revolving door of planning teams in Norquay, Cheng was a good fit there and got things done. But these heritage areas are different and Cheng keeps bringing back proposals that don't work.

Further complicating this is that staff have indicated that the Grandview duplex RT zone may be used in the RS zones across the city as part of the character home rezoning review.

So a lead planner, who doesn't support heritage, is in charge of drafting zoning bylaws for heritage areas such as Chinatown, Grandview and character housing zones. No wonder this is not working. Is the city's real agenda to eliminate heritage districts entirely?

I am aghast of the cultural insensitivity of the Beedie Group to design a glass condo tower that is superbly designed to fit into the beautiful Yuppie community of Yaletown, yet it is absolutely appropriate to blend into the unique cultural and architectural heritage of Chinatown. A facade should more harmonious with the architectural heritage of Chinatown. Your job as Mayor and Councillors of Vancouver is to preserve and protect the most unique Chinatown in North American, not to destroy its unique charm and history. Approving the present Beedie application which I approve on the condition I set below, without would be like inserting a Tim Horton's franchise in the middle of Rideau Hall's dining room in order to give the guests of the Governor General a flavor of Canada.

The Beedie Group has the right idea. My husband Dean Chun Kwong Leung and I were the former owners of this site and its buildings for many years. Mayor Volrich and his Council Members approved our proposal for a 29 storey residential and commercial building as housing for Chinatown's citizens was and still is desperately needed. We've demolished the buildings ready to develop in 1980s (see architect's renderings in www.fayeleung.com; which was presented to Your Worship & Council during the Westbank and Bosa Rezone Public Hearing on Main & Keefer Streets, where my husband Dean & I built Chinatown largest commercial complex in 1970 the Mandarin Trade Centre after, we've expanded Chinatown commercial area from Pender to Prior Streets). However, interest rates in 1983 rose to 29% economic unfeasible to develop. We sold to Rickshaw Drive-in owner Yip who stipulated his heirs should not sell, so my Pender Realty & Insurance Agencies business were to my brother Ken Leong, Oceanridge Realty (across street on Columbia from Beedie now own site) managed this property for Yip as a parking lot until it was sold to Beedie

This site was a rich center of Chinatown culture with historic stories of the people's heritage stories I've known since a young child that is an important part & parcel of Canada Historical Cultural Heritage stories must be preserved perpetually for posterity. Which I'm prepare to work together with Beedie Group to achieve this site development as part of Heritage Chinatown with Chinese character and the historic stories incorporate into this new building compliment part of the surrounding area in the heart of Chinatown.

I approve Beedie's project on the condition that Beedie Group work together to intertwin as part of Chinatown "blend the modern with the old" Chinese Adage: "Chung Sai Hup Bick"/Chinese & Caucasins together

blissfully" in Honor the Chinese Pioneers especially 544 Columbia was the original (then was the only Chinese Pioneers Housing Building in Chinatown) building built for the Chinese Pioneers Housing Building. 



I'm writing today as both a leader in Vancouver's cultural community and also as a resident of Chinatown. This is the second time I've written my opposition to this development, and I feel now as I did when it was first proposed — this development does not do enough to support the existing community in our Chinatown neighbourhood.

I know all to well the housing challenges that Vancouver faces, but I truly believe that letting Vancouver's market developers dictate the terms of social housing and benefits is not working for our city at all. Chinatown could certainly use more "supply" but not luxury market supply—rather we have Chinese seniors in need (who's needs are not met by this development) and lower to mid income families (my family could not afford to rent or own in any of the recent chinatown developments) who's lives are established in this area, and who have the right to stay here. It's nice to have more people in the neighbourhood—absolutely—but what makes Chinatown/Strathcona so wonderful is the social and cultural mix. Keep allowing developments like this one, and that will disappear.

It is my opinion that any building in this neighbourhood should have a much higher percentage of social housing. Obviously a private developer's prerogative is to make a profit, but this profit is being directly taken from your citizens. Collectively, we as Vancouverites are losing land, affordability and diversity, and the benefit is going entirely into private hands. With regard to the development at 105 Keefer street, Vancouver, I wish to note my opposition. I have also canvassed my neighbours, and network, and we are all of the opinion that this development is against the values that define the history and community spirit of Chinatown. Indeed, putting in a large 'luxury style' project in a cherished community enclave not only distorts the neighbourhood character, it also sets a unwanted precedent for any future developments to come. We must take significant effort to preserve the character and affordability of our cultural enclaves such chinatown, punjabi market, and similarly situated neighbourhoods (japantown, 'little Saigon' neighbourhood area, filipino community market area, etc).

I have also learned that the developer has sent in a significant amount of "support letters"; I wonder whether these letters are from actual residents concerned about the los of Chinatown's character, as I cannot fathom that anyone with an interest in preserving the community character would support such a cause. These "support letters" we have seen in other controversial projects, and commented on by various bloggers as being a developers initiative, instead of a grass roots community based effort. Fred Mah, the organizing committee chair, presented at the banquet that 105 Keefer is too tall, too big and not the right fit for Chinatown's character. He urged everyone to come out to speak at the public hearing on May 23. Mah expressed frustration that the lead city planners involved don't seem to understand heritage zoning or care about Chinatown. Heritage or character zoning requires a finetuned balance that makes the retention of existing character buildings of greater economic benefit than for demolition. New development should fit within the historic context. It requires specialized planning staff who appreciate heritage zoning.

In addition to not creating true social housing, the city is also shifting onto taxpayers a financial burden that should be borne by developers. This is because the Vancouver Charter and the city's bylaws exempt developers from paying Development Cost Levies (DCLs) when the land will be used for social housing, as it's defined by the city. DCLs are an important source of revenue and help pay for things like parks, infrastructure and child-care facilities. On this particular project the developer will be exempted from paying about \$155, 570 in DCLs for providing market rentals.

However, these various capital projects are still necessary to service the development. Where does the funding come from if not from the developer? You guessed it — taxpayers' pockets.

Finally, I wish to comment on the prior history of controversial developments that have been approved by the city. This includes several projects where a DCL waiver (development cost levy) and CAC waiver (community amenity contribution) were approved by council, under circumstances that are still not clear. This further includes approve the site on Gore Street for BC housing, as well as the Yaletown land swap. There is concern additionally of the several land parcel offered by the city no information has been presented for public purview. I also note numerous controversial developments where city council has refused to engage residents or allow a full public hearing, where a large group of diverse residents have universally commented on city public hearings being shut down preliminarily. Some example of projects include the Kingsway & Boundary wall centre development, the Marine way and boundary road river district project, East 15th and Clark rental project, east 18th and Commercial project, kingsway and Nanaimo project, venables and commercial drive boffo development, main street and kingsway development, etc.

This chinatown development is merely another amongst this list of projects where residents were not appropriate consulted, and concerns were not adopted. I am hopeful that council will see that the increasing erasure of our cultural history is the result of such projects being approved without accord to resident concerns. I am strongly requesting council reject this project, and place the preservation of our history, before profits.

I am a Vancouver resident who commutes through the area on a daily basis, and I have rented studio space there for several years. I care very much about this unique neighbourhood and the people who live and work in it.

I strongly recommend that staff and council do not approve the rezoning application as it currently stands, for the reasons listed below:

- The social housing that will give Beedie their additional height and density is funded by taxpayers like me. They are also paying reduced DCL and no CAC. Beedie has not truly provided any community benefits to warrant the rezoning.
- It will price low-income locals out of the neighbourhood.
- This project will result in significant increases to taxes, which family-owned businesses like historic Tosi's cannot afford.
- It is inappropriate to use a culturally important site for development that does not respect Chinatown's history and residents.
- It is completely out of proportion. The average building around the area is two to three stories tall; this one is projected to reach twelve.
- The current proposal was not supported by the Chinatown Historic Area Planning Committee.
- Approving this project will set a precedent for future projects.
- Chinatown needs more family units for real families, not million dollar condos and bachelor suites for wealthy singles.

In lieu of condos, the 105 Keefer site could be used for projects like:

- Affordable housing for seniors and families
- A neighbourhood community centre

To Mayor and Council and City Staff:

I am writing to state my opposition to the rezoning proposal for 105 Keefer.

As a fourth-generation Chinese-Canadian, I have personal and familial connections to Vancouver's Chinatown and it is my hope that this neighbourhood will move forward as a vibrant, eclectic, multi-faceted community that respectfully retains pride in its historic roots. In order to do this successfully, I believe it requires fine-tuned and creative stewardship on the part of the City of Vancouver. As an established National Historic District, Vancouver's Chinatown is a rare heritage district and deserves nothing less. By choosing to reject this rezoning proposal, the City has an opportunity to redefine it's position with respect to heritage, to take a firm stance as respectful Stewards of this rare National Heritage District. As Chinatown transitions I hope that the City will choose to stand with the community to proceed with sensitivity, inclusivity and respect.

Development proposals in key heritage neighbourhoods such as Chinatown should not be the same as those applied to non-heritage areas of Vancouver. Chinatown, as with any of Vancouver's rare heritage neighbourhoods, deserves to be creatively reconsidered only in ways that reflect its significance to our city's history. Developments should consider community first, people first and should respect the rich history of this neighbourhood.

I OPPOSE THE 105 KEEFER REZONING PROPOSAL FOR THE FOLLOWING REASONS:

- The City's Chinatown Historic Area Planning Committee did not support this project.
- This is a critical site in an historic area, adjacent to the Chinese Veterans' Memorial Plaza which has deep significance to the Chinese community, and the Dr. Sun Yat Sen Gardens. This site should not be used for market condos. (Please see additional note below)
- The scale of the proposed development is insensitive to the area, where current building heights average 2 to 3 stories.
- The mass of this building is unsuitable for and insensitive to the existing scale of the neighbourhood.
- Via BC Housing, Taxpayers are paying for units, only 8 of which will actually be "affordable," below market rents. 100% of the rental units should be offered below market rents, in line with 30% of OAS.
- The developer's exemption from DCL levies and CAC fees is unreasonable. 106 additional housing units increases the demand on neighbourhood amenities therefore the developer should be contributing to community improvements.
- The amenity space offered by the developer is "temporary."
- This proposal sets a negative precedent for future rezonings in Chinatown.
- The size and quantity of seniors housing units is inadequate.
- Condominiums will not be affordable to the average person or people living in the DTES.
- Low-income residents, especially seniors, will be priced/displaced out of Chinatown.
- This project will result in significant increases to taxes, which small, family owned businesses cannot afford.
- This proposal thwarts the promise of the Chinatown Vision Plan.
- This proposal does not support the Community vision of Vancouver Chinatown as a National Historic District.

The following uses of the site are more appropriate:

- Working with all levels of government the City should be developing housing and amenities on the site that align respectfully with the significance of the Keefer triangle: seniors housing, community amenities/services
- Seniors housing and social housing, 100% at shelter rate or 30% of OAS income.
- Family-oriented residential units that reflect, via building scale and public spaces, a connection to the street and to the community.
- Public plaza/Intergenerational, multi-use community space with an emphasis on Seniors
- Smaller building(s) with density and height that is in keeping with the existing buildings.
- Small retail spaces, in buildings that stress a connection to the street (as opposed to towers) and maintain neighbourhood authenticity.

In summary, I believe this is a very poor proposal for the Chinatown Community. I strongly urge Council to reject it in favour of a solution that more adequately addresses and respects the character of this unique, historic neighbourhood. By choosing to reject this rezoning proposal, the City has an opportunity to redefine it's position with respect to heritage, to take a firm stance as respectful Stewards of this rare National Heritage District. As Chinatown transitions I hope that the City will choose to stand with the community to proceed with sensitivity, inclusivity and respect.

One final note: With respect to the Keefer Triangle site, it's significance cannot be overstated and should not be underestimated. This site is extremely culturally and historically sensitive. The City and developers may regard this site as just another "memorial site," however there are two incidents that deeply embed its meaning for me. Firstly, three of my uncles fought for Canada, fought for the franchise for Chinese-Canadians. They recount the heated debates in advance of signing up—young men, all of whom were born in Canada, questioning why would they fight and risk their lives for a country—their country of birth—that did not accept them as official citizens. Secondly, it is well-documented that among the thousands of Chinese railroad workers who risked their lives, many were simply listed in official documents as nameless: "Chinaman #XX". No name, no status. They did not count.

I currently live in Vancouver, a few blocks outside of Chinatown. I have lived in this community for the past 20 years. Chinatown is the neighbourhood where I do the most of my errands. While using China town area businesses to meet all my daily needs in and around, have I respected profoundly the historic value of the area, which is not so common in Vancouver anymore. To me after seeing the disappearance of Japan Town, which is even closer to where I live, the China Town holds histories of early immigrants from China/Asia and their hardship. It is not historically important but also (because of the old histories) include many culturally important architecture. I have always considered China Town as the cultural historical heritage site, which should be preserved as they are but have been astonished to see the current movement of the same box-buildings. This development will hit our area socially and culturally, I am very concerned with the future of the area.

I strongly recommend that staff and Council does not approve the proposed development for the reasons stated below:

- Low-income residents, especially seniors, will be priced out of Chinatown.
- This project will contribute to increased property taxes that indepedent family businesses cannot afford.
- The Keefer Triangle is a culturally significant site that should not be used for a condominium project.

Dear Mayor and Council,

Re: 105 Keefer Street Rezoning

I am writing to oppose this application.

In October 2013, Council passed a motion committing the City to seek designation by the World Health Organization as a "Global Age-Friendly City." In order to attain this designation, cities must take steps to ensure that seniors have affordable housing; that they have access to culturally-appropriate services; and that they feel socially connected to their communities.

The 105 Keefer proposal, and those that will likely follow, seems to be inconsistent with an age-friendly city. Not only does it provide a woefully inadequate number of affordable housing units for low-income seniors, but it sets the stage for the gentrification of Chinatown.

While gentrification can breathe new life into a neighbourhood, it can also threaten those elements

that have made it feel like home for those who have lived here their entire lives.

With the influx of younger, higher-income residents that this development will likely usher, I fear the displacement of affordable, culturally-appropriate services and amenities for Chinese seniors, like Chinese grocery stores, butcher shops, pharmacies, and clinics. For many of these seniors, not only are these amenities important for their daily subsistence, but they are also an important part of their social lives.

Considering the negative impact of social isolation and loneliness on seniors, this is of great concern.

From a purely aesthetic perspective, I have significant reservations about the design of this building. Not only does it remain far too bulky for its current site, but the design strikes me as a discordant mish-mash of different architectural elements, akin to other unsightly creations like the Telus Garden and Nordstrom building. I presume this was due to efforts to reduce the mass of the structure, but the resulting lack of coherence actually appears to draw more attention to it and thus detracts from its surroundings.

As it currently stands, I cannot support this application, although I might if these issues were better addressed.

Directors of our organization had discussed this matter in a board meeting on May 20 and had resolved that the following position be taken and voiced to City Council for consideration.

- Putting a building with million dollar homes on that site right next to the memorial plaza is not appropriate in Chinatown. Our veterans did not fight wars for Canada to have their memorial treated as a private yard for condo owners.
- It is completely out of proportion. The average building around the area is two to three storeys tall and this one is twelve.
- The mass of this building is too large and unfit for the area.
- Approving this project will set an inappropriate precedent for future projects.
- There is no Community Amenity Contribution for rehabilitation of heritage buildings from this project.

Instead of condos, smaller buildings that make more sense in the fabric of Chinatown could be built on the 105 Keefer site.

This is an unacceptable application and council should not approve it.

To Mayor and Council and City Staff,

Re: Comments for 105 Keefer rezoning application

As a third-generation Chinese-Canadian, now in my mid-90's, I have strong ties to Vancouver's Chinatown. My personal history in the community extends to a time when Canadian-born Chinese were excluded from the franchise. I lived in Strathcona in the 1930s, I studied at the Chinese school in Chinatown. This community and neighbourhood is close to my heart.

I oppose the rezoning application for 105 Keefer and believe if the City can have the progressive vision to reject this rezoning proposal, it represents an opportunity to recalibrate it's position regarding the stewardship of Vancouver's rare heritage neighbourhoods.

I hope that Chinatown, as a community, can protect its history and heritage, and also move forward, inclusively but sensitively. To that end, I believe the City needs to take a strong stand to protect heritage neighbourhoods such as Chinatown. And, I believe this strong stand includes far more stringent guidelines for developers. Current guidelines are not so different from those in operation in non-heritage neighbourhoods, and I believe this is very short-sighted. I urge the City of Vancouver to put teeth into its respect for Chinatown as a National Historic District and to protect all of Vancouver's heritage neighbourhoods. These rare historic areas should not be included in the kind of "cookie-cutter" development that has taken hold of Vancouver. Please develop specific and strong guidelines to protect our rare heritage neighbourhoods.

I OPPOSE THE 105 KEEFER REZONING PROPOSAL for the following reasons:

- This proposal thwarts the promise of the Chinatown Vision Plan.
- This proposal does not support the Community vision of Vancouver Chinatown as a National Historic District.
- The City's Chinatown Historic Area Planning Committee did not support this project.
- This proposal will set a negative precedent for future rezonings in Chinatown.
- This is a critical site in an historic area, adjacent to the Chinese Veterans' Memorial Plaza which has deep significance to the Chinese community, and the Dr. Sun Yat Sen Gardens. This site should simply not be used for market condos.
- The scale of the proposed development is insensitive to the area, where current building heights average 2 to 3 stories.
- The mass of this building is unsuitable for and insensitive to the existing texture and scale of the neighbourhood.
- The size and quantity of seniors housing units being offered is disheartening and inadequate.
- The reduction in family units is disheartening.
- Condominiums on offer will not be affordable to the average person or people living in the DTES.
- Low-income residents, especially seniors, will be priced out of Chinatown.
- This project will result in significant increases to taxes, which small, family owned businesses cannot afford.
- The "promise" of a community/amenity space is temporary.

- Only 8 of the "social housing" units will be offered below market rates, yet this proposal is deemed 100% "social housing". At the same time, 100% of the designated units will be purchased by BC Housing, making this taxpayer-funded. All 100% of the units designated for rental and purchased by BC Housing should be below market rent.
- The developer should not be exempt from DCL levies and CAC fees that should be paid for community/neighbourhood improvements. Adding 106 additional units of housing, increases the demand on neighbourhood amenities and for these reasons, the developer should be contributing to community improvements.

The following uses of the site are more appropriate:

- it would be a progressive move for the City to work with all levels of government to secure this site for senior's housing, community amenities, space and services that are respectful of the Keefer Triangle memorial area.
- Family-oriented residential units that suite the neighbourhood in terms of scale and are designed to have a stronger connection to the street and public spaces.
- Public plaza/ community park space for all ages
- Building(s) that are smaller, with less height and less density, more in keeping with existing buildings in the neighbourhood.
- Small retail spaces, in buildings that stress a connection to the street (as opposed to towers) and maintain neighbourhood authenticity.

I also urge the City to:

- refuse to accept plans for Inclusionary Zoning Areas that dispense with public hearings for projects that meet minimum requirements.
- consult affected communities via public hearings on all future developments.
- rescind automatic height increases on future developments.

I believe this is a very poor proposal for the Chinatown Community that, if accepted, will reflect very poorly on Council and on the City. I strongly urge Council to reject it in favour of a solution that more adequately addresses and respects the character of this unique, historic neighbourhood.

Dear Mayor and Council,

I am writing in non-support of the rezoning proposal at 105 Keefer.

I am a second-generation Chinese Canadian, who grew up visiting Chinatown with my parents and grandparents. Together, as an immigrant family, we did our grocery shopping in Chinatown every weekend. I remember my mother being able to comparison shop from one store to the next, crisscrossing and jaywalking from one side of the street to the other.

Did I mention that I just started my third term on the board of directors of our family clan association that that owns property on Main Street in Chinatown, including affordable retail and office space? My father found work through the Association and its member network when he came to Canada, first in a Chinese restaurant in Vanderhoof owned by one of the elders, then getting a job working at the BC Ferries through the referral of a fellow clan member.

As the eldest son in the family, he sponsored his parents (my grandparents) from China to live with our growing family. Our first home was a three-storey rental on Renfrew Street. My grandfather would walk us across busy Renfrew Street to school each morning, then immediately hop the bus to Chinatown. He would spend the day at the Hoy Ping clubhouse, reading the Chinese newspaper, playing Chinese chess and mahjong, and going for dim sum in Chinatown with his friends. I currently serve on the Hoy Ping board of directors alongside elders who remember my grandfather, whom they recall to be a "character".

You may think that I am all about nostalgia. I could go on about my grandmother and how she lived in Chinatown for the last 15 years of her life, choosing to move out from our family home after our father and grandfather died, and living in a BC Housing bachelor suite at Columbia and Pender. Chinatown allowed her to remain independent, but connected to and supported by community.

Nostalgia aside, my sister and I and many like-minded have been demonstrating authentic revitalization of Chinatown these past two years. We've been hosting a Chinatown Mahjong Social series monthly since Summer 2015, in the Keefer Triangle during the summer months and inside the Chinatown Plaza mall during the cold, wet months. We've also been holding Cantonese classes at

the Mon Keang School inside the heritage Wong Association building, with field trips that use the shops and spaces of Chinatown as practice sites. Mon Keang School had been closed for a few years, and we simply opened the doors and wiped down the desks. Our biggest problem is in meeting demand. We have a perpetual waitlist of 70+ and enrol students from it without needing to advertise.

I am proof positive that revitalization of Chinatown that honours the area's history, people and culture is possible. I therefore reject the rezoning proposal before us at 105 Keefer that places the profit of developers before the regard for a National Historic Site. The applicant's proposal will place immense pressure on the area's actual low-income seniors housing and low-income serving businesses, many of which are also important cultural assets located on historic Pender Street just across the laneway.

I am writing to you regarding my non-support for the Rezoning application at 105 Keefer and 544 Columbia St. I care a lot about the neighbourhood. Chinatown is an important part of Vancouver's heritage and is a visible reminder of the difficult but fulfilling life carved out by an earlier generation of Chinese immigrants to Canada. That history is worth preserving as an object lesson about past discriminativy practices that led to Chinatown's formation, but also as encouragement for new immigrants, that one can overcome many obstacles, even discrimination, to become an integral part of Canadian society.

Personally, I visit Vancouver's Chinatown businesses and institutions several times a year. I appreciate it because Montreal's Chinatown played a formative part of my growing up. Our family dined out and bought groceries in Chinatown, weekly. My parents helped to raise funds for the Montreal Chinese Hospital, which provided essential services to Chinese immigrants, especially a pediatric clinic for new immigrants and a nursing home for senior citizens. Vancouver's Chinatown is an important community for many vulnerable Vancouverites who lived and worked hard in Chinatown and deserve an affordable place to live in their senior years.

I do not support the proposed Keefer development for the following reasons:

The City of Vancouver should make sure that all developers contribute back in fair measure to the local community where they will be making alot of money while also creating infrastructure and social issues to be addressed by the city. Developers must be held accountable to their responsibility to minimize the adverse impact of their developments on the local community.

- Taxpayers should not be paying for the social housing so that the developer, Beedie, can have windfall profits from the rezoning's height and density increases. Beedie will also pay reduced DCL and no CACs. This seems unfair and a disproportionate profit at the expense of Vancouver taxpayers.

Also, in addition to senior housing, why not use Chinatown and adjoining areas to provide affordable housing for providers of essential services, like first responders, health care professionals, teachers, etc.? We will not be able to sustain adequate essential services if the providers cannot afford tonlive in ir near Vancouver. Also, should there not be thought given to keeping some space for health clinics, as I understand that the downtown core is losing health clinics due to rising rents.

In summary, this is a poor proposal and I urge Council to reject it.

I am writing as a concerned resident of Vancouver. I am in opposition to the rezoning application of 105 Keefer St. Chinatown holds special meaning to me, as I'm sure it does also to many of those who are living and who grew up in Vancouver. Chinatown is important not only because of its historical significance, but also because of its social and cultural meanings for its residents and visitors. The recent changes in Chinatown - namely the development of luxury apartments and increase in high-end restaurants and businesses in the last few years have brought tremendous threats to the livelihoods of those who rely on the services and local businesses they have known for decades. Another project like those, especially one so central, so grand and so close to important places, will affect the area even more.

I've read all the letters of support, and I want to argue a few main counterpoints.

- 1. Those in support of this development argue that it will provide more affordable market housing in Vancouver. I agree that Vancouver needs more housing. I am also in the cohort of potential homeowners looking for affordable housing options in the city, but I believe that Chinatown is not the place for this type of market housing development. Sure, 25 units of social housing is great, but a mere 25 units out of the hundred simply does not mean much. This project will also significantly increase property values in the immediate area a new unit here will be as expensive as the rest of downtown. I don't believe that this development is going to provide housing that younger people like myself can afford to buy, it will be another luxury development catered to the affluent and will therefore no longer target the market those who support this development believe it would address.
- 2. Those in support of this development argue that Beedie has changed their proposal to be more inline with the community's needs. I would question this because even though the changes in design (the addition of the courtyard, alleys and smaller look of the frontage) in theory fit in with the built character of the neighbourhood, the developer does not understand the cultural and social context of this neighbourhood's needs. Even if the stores on the ground level are small, in the end, what businesses will be in there? New age restaurants selling \$10 sandwiches? Or haircuts for \$30? People who currently call Chinatown home will be alienated from their own neighbourhood shops and stores while new clientele markets will inject a new and disruptive culture that does not align with Chinatown.
- 3. Those in support of this development argue that because this lot is empty, any development will improve the area with the added benefit of not displacing any existing businesses/residents. This development will house new residents and new businesses that are economically more powerful than the rest of the neighbourhood. It means that more businesses will relocate here to serve that population, which will eventually displace the seniors and historic Chinatown businesses. This is already felt along the fringes of Chinatown along Union street; however the proposed development lies in the heart of Chinatown and will have divisive repercussions from within.
- 4. Those in support of this development argue that the development will include a seniors cultural space. I agree that a space for seniors is very much needed. But I have concerns about what might actually happen to the space once it is built. Should this development still proceed, I believe it is imperative that a lease is signed with

the promised lease terms, and that the space be constructed suitably for the seniors group.

With sincerity, I hope that you will not approve this rezoning application. Until a better solution and framework is cemented for the revitalization of Chinatown that better addresses the concerns re: protecting its heritage and residents, this rezoning, and future ones, should not be approved.

To people in positions of power,

This is another letter voicing a strong opposition the rezoning application for 105 Keefer.

I am a Chinese-Canadian woman, and it disturbs me to see how the neighborhood is very quickly being erased by property and businesses made to serve people who have no interest in preserving the historic culture of Chinatown. This value cannot be measured in dollars. Given the history of this site in relation to the landmarks around it (Chinatown Memorial Square, the Chinese Cultural Centre, Dr. Sun Yat-Sen Garden, and the Andy Livingstone Park), it would be devastating for the area for a 115ft condominium to be plopped in the midst of the block. Vancouver's Chinatown is so small and densely concentrated in comparison to other Chinatowns in metropolitan cities (New York, Toronto, San Fran, etc.), and it cannot withstand another condo. What's more is that if this application is approved, this sets the wheels in motion for future developers to move in. I'm afraid of Chinatown losing more of the businesses that have been serving the Chinese community for the past many decades. Just in the last few years, these businesses have had to close: Chinatown Supermarket, Fu Wah Chinese Restaurant, Golden Wheat Bakery, Keefer Bakery, Lee Loy BBQ Meats, Pender Seafoods, Top King BBQ Meats, and others. In place of them, businesses like Virtuous Pie, Matchstick Cafe, Starbucks, Space Lab, etc. have taken over.

Last week I struck up a conversation with a friendly bearded man who was passing as I was parking my car on Pender at Gore. He said he was opening up a new vegan soft serve spot... Why does Chinatown need a vegan soft serve spot?? It's super entitled and unthinking. I know I am digressing, but it's this kind of entitled and historically insensitive attitude that is no different from colonialism.

I am speaking from the perspective of a middle class Chinese-Canadian who works in the arts and music community. I know that people like me are the direct target of developers like the Beedie Group; they want to appeal to the aesthetic and lifestyle of 'clean, modern, streamlined living' that is design-focused and influenced by Chinese (and Japanese) aesthetic histories. But they are directly threatening and disrespecting the people who are alive and living right now (!!) while claiming that "no loss of jobs or displacement of existing residents in the community would occur" as the location is a "long-term underused former gas station site." While the proposed rezoning includes 25 units of lowto-moderate income seniors housing to be owned by BC Housing, it does not account for the disproportionate number of 'market value' suites which will further raise the property values around the neighborhood, and thereby displacing existing residences and businesses.

Not only does the proposed rezoning threaten the heritage buildings and social housing for seniors in the neighborhood, it also threatens the City's own attempts at preserving Chinatown through the Chinese Society Legacy Program. As NDP Jenny Kwan writes, "The Chinese Society Legacy Program is aimed at stabilizing the area's 12 heritage buildings as important heritage assets and cultural legacies. On May 20, 2017, the community will be celebrating the first of these renovations completed by the Mah Society, which has been recognized with a 2017 Heritage Award from the City. It would truly be a shame to put these hard fought victories at risk."

I am writing as one voice in what I hope to be many voices that are opposed to this application. I truly hope it is not too late. I realize how difficult it is to get people to feel that they have a fighting chance when it comes to money and politics. The recent voter turn out is just one example. For every letter that is written, there are at least 1000 of us who are opposed. It just takes a lot for someone to sit down and write a letter. I am writing on behalf of many who are too busy, too pessimistic, too disenfranchised to do so, and I know I am not the only one.

A few years ago, I made an NFB feature documentary, Everything Will Be, which chronicled a year in the life of a dozen local denizens during a period of transition in Vancouver's Chinatown. I spent a year in the community, following subjects ranging from a realtor to the 90 year old vendor who sold newspapers on the streets. As a child of working class immigrant Chinese parents, I spent a lot of my childhood in Vancouver's Chinatown and I remember the vibrancy and most importantly, the strong sense of community. It was a community which evolved from a history of racism and oppression. In the years of making of the film, I walked away with a deeper appreciation for the community and an understanding for the need to preserve its history. Since the release of the film, almost all of the small, local businesses featured are gone and that strong sense of community is being threatened. I write this letter concerned that the 105 Keefer proposal will further deepen that loss.

I strongly oppose the 105 Keefer proposal for several reasons. The economic displacement of residents and small businesses could price out low income residents and affordable businesses. The Keefer Triangle is a culturally sensitive site, next to the Memorial Plaza, historic Pender, Dr. Sun Yat-Sen Gardens, and the Chinese Cultural Centre. I believe the site would be best used as an intergenerational community space and/or provide more social/senior housing.

Additionally, the proposed Keefer building is too big and dense for the area. The architect, Joe Wai, describes Chinatown's architecture as on a human scale. I've always liked the way he phrased that because we too often ignore the small, human aspects of a community in favour of big profits. In the documentary, I tried to put a human face on the residents of the community and I truly hope that you will consider the history, the people in the community and oppose the 105 Keefer proposal.

Dear Mayor and City Councillors of Vancouver:

I am writing to oppose the current 105 Keefer rezoning application, in Vancouver's Chinatown which has been already designated as a National Historic Site of Canada.

I am writing as a person who has been volunteering in social service organizations and grassroots social work in the Chinatown area since 2014. I care about what happens in Chinatown, because through volunteering and grassroots work I have become friend of some local youths and some Chinese-speaking seniors, who need affordable housing, affordable groceries, and health services in a linguistically and culturally intimate environment. They need a Chinatown development in the direction of more social housing, more small business, more community spaces, more ways to share their linguistic and cultural knowledges. They need Chinatown as an intimate, livable place. They don't need -- and we don't want to see -- Chinatown being developed towards intensified speculations of local and global capital: speculations which after all, tend to dismiss the careful planning of land in its real historical depths and real social needs, speculations that tend to abuse lands and free markets to benefit mostly those who are already in highly privileged positions.

I am also writing as an international student in Canada. There are many international students like me, who come from different towns and cities where issues of displacement and housing speculations are prevalent, and oftentimes, ordinary citizens could do almost nothing about it. We come here for education, for a new way of life, but also for a hope to see a difference in Vancouver, in Canada – a hope that housing could be affordable if we need, especially for the vulnerable; a hope that the arbitrary will of arm or money could be opposed if we do speak, even though we are often assumed simply as foreign students knowing nothing about the local politics (which is not true). We hope to see a genuine difference here, where social justice is possible, where collective decision-making could be done, and where even an international student like me could send you a letter.

I am sure that I am not standing alone. Many students and community friends, like me, are hoping to see a genuinely and carefully developed Chinatown with deep and respectful relevance to the Indigenous cultures, the Chinese diasporic cultures, the different ethnic and racialized histories, the working class cultures, and the intergenerational heritages, passed from many grandmas and grandpas to many granddaughters and grandsons. We will lose the diversity of cultures, if we keep building homogenous high-rises to overpower the distinct features of local neighbourhoods. We can no longer talk about heritages meaningfully, when the Chinese Memorial Square is under the shadow of yet another high-rise. We cannot have the heritages, without the seniors' knowledge. And we cannot see the seniors any more, without proper affordable housing for low-income seniors, without a place for them to live in where they feel most livable and related to. On these grounds, I oppose any development projects on 105 Keefer (including the current rezoning application) that displace/downplay the cultural significance of diversity and heritage, as well the spatial significance of affordable housing and livability.

I am writing this email to express my concerns about the Rezoning proposal for 105 Keefer St.

For over 30 years since I was a child, I have cherished my time in Chinatown. Whether shopping, dining, socializing, performing or celebrating, Vancouver's Chinatown has been a unique urban gem to me. As a proud Vancouverite of caucasian descent, it has been a beautiful experience to witness the daily actions and lives of non-white cultures especially the Chinese who have been so strongly integrated with and within Canada's history.

Now as an adult, my Chinese-Canadian wife and her family who have spent their lives enjoying and supporting Chinatown have afforded me further respect to this singular place. This all comes with the sharp understanding of the precarious nature the neighbourhood now finds itself in.

Staff should NOT recommend the application because of the reasons below.

- The proposal for 105 Keefer is entirely unacceptable and wholly unnecessary. This dubious effort serves a small group of people that do NOT need this building - not the developers and condomarketers, nor the citizens of Chinatown and Vancouver.
- It's time to show some respect and take responsibility for preserving precious history instead of permanently undoing a susceptible neighbourhood by catering to the monetary whims of those who already have taken away so much from the citizens.
- Clearly there exists an established fundamental reverence for this space as an historic and culturally significant epicentre for the neighbourhood. What kind of message is being sent to the Chinese community when this irreplaceable site is overtaken with absolutely NO regard for the rights of the people who act as its stewards and caretakers?
- The garish entitled behaviour and dogmatic irrational reasoning on the part of the developer and its lobbyists are insulting and disrespectful at best; abusive and injurious in the longterm. This is hardly the kind of outfit a responsible civil servant would want to align with.
- It is with great incredulity that I find the City of Vancouver even considering provision for this greedy piggish gesture within a larger region already crippled and oppressed by unruly, speculative real estate shenanigans.

This email is for the Rezoning application at 105 Keefer and 544 Columbia St.

I have a long history of involvement with the neighbourhood. I lived in Chinatown in my youth, worked in the neighbourhood until very recently (I owned a business in the neighbourhood for 13 years) and currently sit on the Board of a non-profit arts organization that is located there. Chinatown is an important part of my life in Vancouver.

I don't support the application for many reasons including the following:

I am uncomfortable with the idea that the Beedie group will profit on the backs of taxpayers. As I understand the proposal, taxpayers are paying them for the social housing. With discounted DCL and no CACs, Beedie will not be paying their fair share to justify the rezoning they have applied for. The opportunity to develope in the neighbourhood should not be granted without substantive contributions to the neighbourhood which include respect for the existing social fabric. The neighbourhood is, or should be, more than a "field of play" for profit-seeking interests.

Further, I believe small retail businesses in the area will be priced out due to increased taxes from developments like this.

This is happening along many transit corridors in East Vancouver - in large measure due to up-zoning - and I don't believe the full impact of these changes in the culture of independent business in the city is yet understood (I.e., I'm not sure we can survive on a mix of craft breweries and distilleries...). The need to alleviate pressures on housing should not come at the expense of independent businesses and should be understood in the context of more holistic planning policies.

The building proposed is out of scale with the immediate surroundings. It has been rejected by the City of Vancouver Chinatown Historic Area Planning Committee and acceptance of the project will, I believe, set a bad precedent for future development in Chinatown. More appropriate uses for the site would include much needed seniors and social housing.

Architecturally, I would like to see the project scaled to the much-loved historic texture of the neighbourhood. Buildings that are narrower that reflect the character of Chinatown might be a place to start rather than monolithic structures like the Beedie proposal.

This is an unacceptable application and I strongly urge the council not to approve it.

- It is not right that taxpayers are paying for the social housing so that Beedie can profit from the rezoning's height and density increases. They are also paying reduced DCL and no CACs. This is not fair.
- It will displace low income residents economically.
- It will displace affordable Chinatown businesses that residents depend on.
- This is a critical site in a historic area. It should not be used for market condos.
- The proposed project does not meet "a significantly higher standard of architectural and urban design excellence" required to warrant the additional height.
- It is more massive and dense than all the buildings next to it.
- It was rejected by the City of Vancouver Chinatown Historic Area Planning Committee.
- The number of seniors housing units being offered is dismal.
- Approval of this project will result in developments like this becoming the norm in Chinatown, ignoring the fact that it is a historic neighbourhood.
- It is inappropriate to build luxury condos next to the memorial statue.
- The reduction in family units is regrettable.

The following uses of the site are more appropriate:

- Affordable housing for seniors
- A community centre for the neighbourhood
- A community plaza

This is an unacceptable application and council should not approve it.

Dear Mayor and City Councillors,

I oppose the Development Applications for 105 Keefer, 544 Columbia, and the City's current direction in Chinatown. Government listened in past to right injustice and wrongs in Chinatown. It can decide similarly today, and to change course. I urge City Council to listen to the Community and to reject these two proposals as presented.

I'm a Vancouver born, proud Chinese Canadian citizen and resident, with deep roots in Chinatown and B.C. My family and I have a direct relationship and connection to the Chinese Cultural Centre, Chinese Canadian Military Museum, and the Veterans and Railway Workers Memorial that are in the immediate vicinity of these projects. We will be impacted by this decision. More importantly many local residents including youth, marginalized, vulnerable low to no income citizens, and seniors in the area are at risk of homelessness and will be adversely impacted.

My family paid the head tax, faced extreme poverty and racism for generations as marginalized "non-persons". They helped build Chinatown and its strong identity, along with many others in Chinatown. They also actively fought the Chinese Exclusion Act, volunteered in World War II military efforts, as well as rallied Victoria to earn citizenship and win the vote for Chinese Canadians 1947. The human rights and freedoms of many Canadians and immigrants exist today as a direct result of these efforts 75 years ago. These are significant direct contributions by my family and the Chinese in Vancouver's Chinatown. The Government listened.

My comments and concerns with 105 Keefer and 544 Columbia:

1) Vancouver's Chinatown is a cultural historical district, a national treasure, and a significant neighbourhood to my family, local Chinese Canadians, immigrants, as well as to all Canadians and tourists who may visit. The National Trust of Canada recognizes Chinatown's heritage value and cultural sites as endangered. Vancouver Chinatown is important to all Canadians and our Canadian identity.

The values of equality, social justice, freedom and opportunity are at the heart and soul of Chinatown's foundation. These values must be upheld and preserved for present and future generations, not eroded or frozen in the past.

2) The Chinatown Historic Area Planning Committee, Chinatown community, residents and leaders overwhelmingly and strongly oppose these projects, including the latest proposal. These developments are inappropriate and do not adequately address concerns raised by Community. I agree with the Community.

This includes: The Chinese Benevolent Association, the Canadian Military Museum Society, the Chinese Cultural Centre, the Canadian Alliance of Chinese Associations, Chinese Canadian youths and seniors living in Chinatown. Additional 1800 oppose this project by petition (Chinatown Concern), more by email, and 75% of all respondents overall (G.Straight).

- 3) Chinatown is not just West Pender Street. Keefer and Columbia do not have strong enough heritage protections nor enough provisions and protections to support existing seniors, low to no income residents and renters in the area.
- They do not provide enough truly affordable and social housing for existing local residents in relation to incomes and to national Canadian standards. Current residents cannot afford to live in the majority of the market units in these developments. 25 units of senior's housing are insufficient. This may satisfy City requirements but is a low standard for this area. A higher number is needed. Compare to the balance of hundreds of luxury units between these projects, and hundreds more in the area that have already been built or approved.
- 5) The Veterans and Railroad Workers Memorial at Keefer and Columbia is a standing tribute to the direct sacrifices and contributions of Chinese Canadians in Chinatown, across B.C., and Canada. It honours our past Canadian history of darkness and the triumphs and victories over institutional racism, poverty and segregation. It is also a living tribute for posterity and future generations, one of sacrifice, respect, and gratitude for the emancipation, freedom and equality of all Canadians, particularly those most marginalized.

This is not an ornament. These projects abut, loom over, and encroach upon the Memorial, the Chinese Cultural Centre, and Chinese Canadian Military Museum. They do not enhance and compliment them as important and significant heritage and legacy. Rather they dwarf and minimize them. The predominance of market luxury units is an inappropriate solution in an inappropriate location. They conflict with the values that are the sacred foundation of Chinatown and this Memorial. They minimize the importance of the Memorial and significant heritage buildings in the area and do not enhance or revitalize the area around the Memorial, Cultural Centre and Museum. They negatively impact the adjacent heritage buildings in the area and the whole neighbourhood.

These developments are way too tall and the massing too large for the sites. Even with setbacks 105 Keefer is too large. 12 storeys dwarf the Chinese Cultural Centre and the Memorial. Frankly, the architect's renderings are deceptive of scale and perspective; and the latest changes to the proposal are not nearly enough by all accounts.

- These projects offer very little benefit and amenities to Chinatown and its residents. The proposed seniors centre and a courtyard are positive but not particularly open and inviting. 544 Columbia does not have appreciable community amenities. Cultural and public spaces are needed for local residents to be healthy, bond, socialize and thrive, openly and freely. Public green space, community centre, communal vegetable gardens, art and culture facilities, or public intergenerational spaces would be beneficial.
- 7) Today, it is not "racism" but a class war upon the poor in Chinatown and public interests. Global speculation and redevelopments threaten Chinatown now by placing higher importance and value upon wealth and tangible real estate property over Chinatown's significant heritage, its people and their community.

The premise that "Chinatown is dying" will not be improved by building predominantly market redevelopments that do not support the majority of local residents. These expensive condo redevelopments gentrify and continue to add pressure upon existing affordable housing and further exacerbate high housing costs and land values in the area and erode housing options for locals. They also impact small businesses that cannot afford rising rents.

Chinatown is being eroded by policies that promote if not incentivize local and global real estate speculation, empty homes and investment properties, as well as wealth inequality. Wealth inequality increases conflicts, marginalization, displacement and dislocation of poorer residents from and within their community. This needs to change.

8) Developers of these projects should not be rewarded with tax incentives, bonuses and density waivers to build primarily "market" luxury housing, in an overheated housing crisis when affordability relative to incomes has never been worse and homelessness is rising. These projects "sacrifice" respectively little in trade for higher density and high private profits. This does not improve affordability nor do benefits accrue to residents in Chinatown.

Government needs to listen carefully again. There are important lessons to be learned from Chinatown, our elders and past, to ensure its future meets success. Honour and respect of past generations and living elders in Chinese culture is sacrosanct. Respect and honour of Chinatown's past and the current existing residents and the community are needed. The Memorial is tribute to those efforts and actions are needed to uphold those strong values.

Chinese Canadians and all Canadians have prospered in past because Government directed policies to local, regional and national concerns of Canadians first, including the poorest and most marginalized residents.

Let's not waste this opportunity to build truly affordable and social housing in the community, by national standards. The needs of Chinatown are great but the City can work with senior levels of Government to better conserve, enhance and compliment what exists in Chinatown and provide more benefits and opportunities so locals can thrive and prosper.

Please reject these two proposals, listen and respect the input of the local Chinatown neighbourhood community, its residents, veterans and seniors. To do otherwise is a betrayal of both past, present and future generations of Chinatown and all Canadians, our national heritage, and cultural identity.

Chinatown is my neighbourhood, and I depend on its stores for my daily needs - culturally relevant groceries and items. It is a place where I can be with the Chinese community, especially seniors, as well as feel connected to my ethnic heritage in the context of Canada.

I'm opposed to the rezoning application because of the following:

- Like the retail businesses in recent developments, the retail units in this project will be unaffordable to seniors.
- It will raise commercial lease prices and price affordable businesses out of Chinatown.
- Luxury condos are not an appropriate use of this culturally sensitive site.
- The seniors housing proposed in woefully inadequate.
- Approval of this project will result in developments like this becoming the norm in Chinatown, ignoring the fact that it is a historic neighbourhood.
- I am particularly concerned that this will accelerate the rate of gentrification of Chinatown. This is just another form of ethnically targeted displacement, not unlike the bulldozing of Hogan's Alley and Strathcona for the viaducts.

Here are some of my ideas of what could be on the 105 Keefer site instead of condos:

- Affordable housing for seniors
- A community centre for the neighbourhood
- All ages community facillity
- A green space
- I would be delighted to see a community space at this 105 Keefer site, as it would truly meet the felt needs of seniors who feel like they have nowhere to go and socialize. Many are experiencing social isolation. Such a space will also allow youth to reconnect with their culture and elders, promoting the strengthening of social bonds as well. It would also allow more grassroots attempts as showcasing Chinese culture and history to the diverse population of Vancouver and its visitors.

In summary, this is a poor proposal and I urge council to reject it.
