I write to you as a renter (and a former renter in the area) imploring you to approve this proposal, which will bring much needed secured tenure rental homes in the area.

I lived in this area in the upstairs suite of a Vancouver Special with two other roommates for a year. I loved running around Trout Lake, visiting the community centre, and sought out volunteer opportunities in the area, planning to settle down for longer term. However, when one of my roommates moved out, our landlord accused us of breaking the lease and tried to get us to leave. She didn't report us to the RTA, but she would call incessantly asking mundane questions about the heating bill, whether we put out the garbage, etc. and if she didn't get a response immediately would call the other roommates. She also showed up unannounced once asking to inspect the suite and find out what was really going on.

When yet another roommate moved out, we decided to move as it was far too stressful constantly being surveilled and not knowing whether we would be evicted if a new roommate moved in. I would have loved to stay the area and I likely would have if there had been more choices available for renters.

Please approve this proposal and many many more like it. Renters deserve homes too, and homes that are close to amenities, schools, services, transit, and employment centres.
