I am writing to oppose the tower potentially going up at 777 Pacific Boulevard, as well as any other overly tall buildings that will penetrate the view cones.

Mountains are just that—mountains. They exist all around the world and our north shore mountains in particular lack both the awe that the Himalayas inspire and the grandeur of the Rockies. Ours are not very high and not very dramatic.

Our city is also nothing special on a global scale. There are a lot of glass towers indicative of the economy and technology of the early millennium. There is a lot of repeated shape and form, although that is starting to change. Really, the city is pretty boring, architecturally.

But put the horizontal curves of the mountains with the straight vertical lines of the towers and you have some magic starting to happen. To Mayor and Council, Premier of BC, Minister responsible for PavCo, and PavCo CEO,

I'm a fifth-generation Vancouverite who values the city's relationship to its surroundings and thinks that visual and aesthetic relationship is a public good that should be protected.

I oppose the 400-foot PayCo tower being proposed. It penetrates the view cone, change the appearance of the city and block the public's view of the mountains.

It has long been said that Vancouver is an ugly city in a beautiful location. With virtually every new building that is built, this becomes more true. The quality of our architecture is ever more in an inverse relation to its luxury cost.

And with every tower that is built, the views afforded to the millionaires who can buy space in the top floors are at the same time effectively confiscated from everyone else.

Vancouver's views are one of the only things left to the public in a city where public space is increasingly rare and privatized and where too many streets have become shadowy canyons. To remove the sense of our iconic mountains on top of all of the other losses is I believe a mistake and one that will be very difficult to remedy.

Furthermore these ever increasing heights set a dangerous precedent. The Gillespie tower is already well out of scale on our skyline.

Please approve the lower tower alternative at 300ft as it won't penetrate the view cone. Of course, it too is an example of what I think some architectural critics call "the embarrassment of architecture" - the surrounding landscape highlighting the poverty of the architecture. Both proposals are classic examples of form following finance, but that seems to be what passes for architecture in this city. At the very least, I beg you to please limit heights.

In conclusion, please protect Vancouver's historic views. They are a public amenity and since they a key element of what defines this city, they also define us. As Henri Lefebvre said in 1968, we have a right to the city because the city forms us in turn. UN Habitat III, held on the 40th anniversary of Habitat I hosted by Vancouver in 1976, reaffirmed the right to the city. So much of the city has already been appropriated by Big Money in precisely the manner described by Lefevre, particularly over the past ten years. I would ask you to do your part in taking this tendency in hand.

Thank you very much for your time and what I hope is your thoughtfulness in making this decision.

Looking west from FalseCreek, looking north from Mt. Pleasant, looking west from Hastings & Campbell, we've already lost a view of the Lions. In Pauline Johnson's The Legends of Vancouver, those peaks are named The Two Sisters, so-called to remind us of the courage and sacrifice needed for peace.

With the loss of these views, we loose so much more than anyone can gain.

Hold true to the view cone policy.

Dear Mayor and Council,

Please reject the 400ft PavCo tower and preserve Vancouver's public views of the mountains from the Cambie view cone, which is one of five only panoramic views of the city. Our public views is a priceless public asset that must be protected for current and future generations.

Because this rezoning proposal never received its own open house or public consultation process separate from NEFC Plan, the impact to our public views were not adequately communicated to the public or assessed by the public. Therefore, I want to highlight the last major study the City did to reflect the history of the public and past City Council's sentiments on the importance of the Cambie public view.

1. In January 2010 (RTS# 08321), Council reaffirmed the rigorous application of the Cambie view corridors after considering the City-commissioned Vancouver Views results.

"Resolution E: Council affirmed the current, rigorous application of Cambie Street and Cambie Bridge view corridors. No further action is required."

- 2. In the City's 2010 Vancouver View studies, the following results were found from a poll commissioned by the city with 95% level of confidence:
- Residents rated the Cambie panoramic views as the top three most important public views. With the Cambie view in question at the #2 spot.
- 53% of residents rated mountains as most important element to a view, beating out both water and the cityscape
- 93% of residents said that the mountain part of the Cambie view was the most important part of the view
- 70.5% of residents enjoy the Cambie view in question via walking and public transit
- For the "Do you have any additional comments" question, 32% of people who chose to offer a comment reemphasized that mountain views were very important. It was the top comment.
- Attitudes towards protecting public views do not change much. The study found that between 1989 and 2009,
- "Attitudes towards managing the protection of views have not changed over the past 20 years in two respects. Residents are as likely now as they were in 1989 to agree that downtown development is contributing to the loss of important views. They are also equally likely to disagree that there is no need to be concerned about restricting development to protect specific views."

Further to prior comments (below), I am strongly opposed to the subject rezoning, principally due to the impact that the proposed development would have on established public views. Again, it's remarkable, from my perspective, that the City's planners should have so little respect for long-established view protections that are broadly supported by Vancouverites.

Notably, the subject policy report incorporates a summary of public feedback received in connection with the NEFC Planning Process, including the following..

"Approximately 200 emails, letters and form letters were received by Council and staff during the adoption of the NEFC Plan expressing concern with the proposal for higher heights of the three Georgia Gateway buildings and the implications for Vancouver's public mountain views and View Protection Guidelines. Planning staff have reviewed the concerns and are confident that the Georgia Gateway buildings outlined in the General Policy for Higher Buildings are unique, limited and clearly defined and do not diminish the strength or certainty of Vancouver's public view policies."

Frankly, as the author of one of the "approximately 200 emails, letters and form letters". the suggestion that the so-called "Georgia Gateway buildings".. "are unique, limited and clearly defined and do not diminish the strength or certainty of Vancouver's public view policies" falls far short of a serious response to legitimate concerns raised, and should not be viewed as a credible basis for dismissing them.

From my perspective, it's nothing but nonsense to suggest that the proposed development represents "a significant and recognizable new benchmark for architectural creativity and excellence, while making a significant contribution to the beauty and visual power of the city's skyline", or that the proponent could "shape and sculpt the tower at upper levels to establish a dialogue between the three towers that together form the Georgia Gateway". With all due respect, this would be laughable if the implications weren't so significant.

Personally, it's not clear to me, on the basis of information included in the staff report, that the alternative 300 ft design is a supportable option. But, on height alone, it would be a preferable outcome.

Finally, I should add that concerns expressed here are not new. As noted a decade ago, in connection with the counterproductive removal of mature trees from QE Park, the ever growing height of downtown towers was already obstructing the views to nature that make Vancouver a special place.


Subject: Northeast False Creek Plan ("NEFC Plan") and Viaducts Replacement Project

Vancouver, unlike many European cities which have been building apartments for many decades does not take into account the overall physical aspect of the city and these new buildings are totally unacceptable as their characteristics will have negative consequences in the quality of apartments for many people already living downtown. In consequences, there must be a detailed study about what characteristics of new individual buildings would not penalized people who have decided to live downtown as it was desired by the city. Apartments are very interesting area to live in but in Canada and Vancouver it is clear that there is little knowledge about how to maximise the pleasant way from them. European cities in all rich countries have much experience and Vancouver should consider their constructions and choices.

### Dear City Official,

I am writing you to share my opposition to the PavCo tower proposal. There are two main reasons I oppose this tower. First, the tower is much higher than the others in the area and will set a precedent that buildings this high will be allowed. This will change the character of the area and create a less liveable city. This should be of great concern as Vancouver's status as a liveable and beautiful city helps to attract tourists and makes it a wonderful place to live. Second, I am concerned that this new tower will penetrate the view cone and destroy the public views of the mountains. Our beautiful mountains are part of what make Vancouver a world class city. If we block the views of these mountains for our residents and visitors, this will fundamentally change what makes Vancouver such a wonderful city.

I am a lifelong Vancouverite. I great up in Kits and, after some time away for school, have moved back and live near Science World. I am a professor at UBC and get to share with all our students — Canadian and international — what a wonderful city we have. Whenever you meet new people when you travel, everyone always marvels at what a beautiful city Vancouver is. A big part of that is its natural beauty — particularly the mountains. Another large component is how green and sustainable it is. Allowing a large developer to build a monstrously high tower, which is not at all in keeping with the character of the area, undermines this. Our reputation as a beautiful, sustainable and green city are at stake here. In addition, the selling of our public good, the views, to a private company also undermines Vancouver's goal of being an equitable city — concerned about the welfare of the community as a whole, not just the wealth of a small number of developers.

It seems a clear alternative is available to us. I suggest that the lower tower, at 300 feet, is still very tall and should satisfy the developers need to make money on this land. It will also provide housing for people in the area. And, most importantly, it does not do all this at the expense of other Vancouverites and our shared view. The role of a city government is to protect the interests of Vancouverites as a whole, not simply the interests of a small group of developers. I urge you to stop this initial tower plan and support the compromise tower at 300 feet that serves all our needs.

**RE: View Corridors and Vancouverism** 

I write to offer a few observations on the value of protecting public views in Vancouver.

It is well known that Vancouver is consistently ranked as one of the world's most liveable cities. There is even a worldwide movement in urban planning known as 'Vancouverism'. The main principles of Vancouverism include the creation of public spaces, including green park spaces, and the preservation of view corridors.

The renowned Chinese-Canadian architect Bing Thom described Vancouverism this way on CBC Radio: "It's a spirit about public space ... we built a city that really has a tremendous amount of space on the waterfront for people to recreate and to enjoy ... people have access to the water and the views."

But Vancouverism didn't just happen. It has a fascinating history. So much of what gives Vancouver its character comes from a 92 year old report, commissioned by the City of Vancouver in 1926, and known as The Bartholomew Plan. The vision and rationale set out in that ancient document is awe-inspiring. All the things that make Vancouver great are in there; rapid transit, green belts, view corridors, neighborhood parks, and civic art.

The Bartholomew Plan puts a lot of emphasis on the value of planning for parks and other public spaces. It says: "The people need them. They are fully as useful in promoting community health and happiness and contentment as any of the recognized urban necessities."

The Plan also notes that "parks and other pleasure resources" have positive effects on property values. It says: "The ability of parks and other pleasure resources to increase the attractiveness of a city is no longer questioned." It goes on to describe those assets as "a form of insurance against a decline of neighbourhood value and attractiveness".

In particular, the Plan states:

Where natural beauty exists there will be possible a blending of good architectural design and natural beauty that is most to be desired. Vancouver possesses unsurpassed natural beauty in the proximity

of mountains and of naturally beautiful water prospects. These should be incorporated in the design for a civic centre.

The Plan concludes: "If a general plan is consistently followed, the ultimate scheme will produce remarkable returns. Vancouver will take a place second to none in the world if it can complete such a system of recreational facilities ... The plan may seem extravagant to some, but it is not out of scale with the greatness of the city or beyond its future needs."

That is the definition of a visionary statement. As a life-long Vancouver resident, I urge today's Mayor and Council to have the same kind of vision and foresight that your forbearers showed in the Bartholomew Plan. Please take steps to preserve view corridors. To continue to be an exceptional place, the City needs to stay true to its planning principles, promote community interests, take a broader view of real estate metrics, and listen to the lessons of our history. Protecting view corridors makes sense. It is tried and true. And it will pay dividends. To the whole community. Forever.
