My name is Graham Heal. I am a resident of Vancouver, and I oppose this rezoning application. I am here on behalf of my deceased Mother, my Father and Granville Gardens Retirement Living Community.

I am not here because I am against development or residential densification.

I am here because my Mother's final three weeks were spent in the loving care of Vancouver Hospice and because I have hopes that my Father will also be taken care of there, when his time comes. And I know that they would both be doing what I am doing now, if they were in my shoes.

In 2017, my Mother, Cecile, had been approved for "Assisted End of Life" due to her condition, but, before she could effectuate her plan, she had one more job to do. Her last sale as a realtor was her own home. In order to show the home, she had to remove herself from it and, given her advanced condition, we were lucky to get a bed at Vancouver Hospice. While still haggling for a better price she closed the sale of her home from her bedside from the Hospice. Now comforted that this final effort was completed, Cecile passed into unconsciousness 48 hours later for the final time. Within another 48 hours, she passed quietly and comfortably, sensitively monitored by Hospice nurses, who still spoke to her to the last.

During the three weeks of my Mother's stay at Vancouver Hospice, my family was badly fractured, in many ways unmoored from all that gave us safe harbour. Without the warm care, sensitivity and love from EVERY management and health-care staff member at Vancouver Hospice, this tragic time would have been much worse. Mom had told me that she'd be happy to pass there and, it helped so much that she was, as she reached for the finish line, still cracking zingers!

This hospice facility, this warm HOME, is a crucial essential service that any community that cares about its residents, must nurture and protect. Any decent society must consider its priorities and what it's prepared to fight for. Vancouver Hospice played a major role in keeping my family together. Its contribution, at this critical time for us, was undeniable. Please do not do anything that would affect its smooth, understated and effective operations.

So, YES, re-zone, re-develop and densify. But......NOT HERE!! Not on this stretch of Granville Street!! Please keep the back hoes and excavators away from Vancouver Hospice, truly a treasure worth protecting in our great city!

Let me finish with these 3 items for emphasis:

- 1) YES..... By all means DENSIFY!!
- 2) YES ......Vancouver Hospice is an ESSENTIAL SERVICE!!
- 3) NO DO NOT re-zone and re-develop on this stretch of Granville Street. Anywhere but here!

To allow developers to take advantage of the interim rezoning policy are not required to meet the policy's stated criteria, which includes "contextual fit with neighboring development."

It's not right:

Although the hospice was required to meet stringent zoning requirements so the building fit in with neighboring homes, the City of Vancouver is now considering an application to rezone an adjacent property under the city's Interim Policy for Affordable Housing Choices.

It's not right:

Executive Director Simin Tabrizi said the city's social planning staff "expressly stated they will recommend rejection of this proposal," but that recommendation was not included in the report to council.

It's not right:

The construction phase, which is expected to last two years, could mean the temporary closure of the hospice.

And most importantly it's not moral:

"When a recent patient (Joan) passed away and she was removed by the ambulance, we stayed at the door with the kids. And the kitchen staff, the doctors, the nurses were there with us, giving support, like an honor guard as we said goodbye,"

"That space would be overlooked by rooftop balconies and windows in the adjacent three-story tower. Picture someone in their condo legitimately enjoying a barbecue on their rooftop, laughing and having drinks when someone has died next door and needs to be taken out. The two things don't really go well together."

Please reject and relook the current 4 story, 21 unit development and save our Granville Street Community Hospice.
