

What is the Vancouver Plan and why do we need a city-wide plan?

Unanimous Council resolution in 2018 to initiate a city-wide plan



The Vancouver Plan is...

- A long-range plan to guide growth and change for the next 30 years
- Vancouver's first Councilendorsed city-wide land use strategy



Vancouver Plan Opportunity

- Unified vision of the city's future
- Implement bold Council-approved plans to address the climate and affordability crises
- Align with regional planning initiatives
- Advance Reconciliation, equity and resilient initiatives

- Parks, plazas, beaches, gardens
- Diverse neighbourhoods

Address our biggest challenges





Explored

- Three Foundational Principles
- Three Big Ideas
- Three Key Areas of Change

Findings

- Strong support:
 - More housing choice in all areas
 - Complete neighbourhoods
 - Job space
 - Climate solutions
- Preference: spread out growth in transit and shopping areas




Indigenous Involvement

- Reconciliation is foundational































Engagement Activities


- Talk Van Survey (eight languages; 2,621 responses)
- Randomized Ipsos poll (eight languages; 1,725 respondents)
- 10 public information sessions and 13 pop-up events
- 23 **stakeholder** meetings
- 19 youth workshops and meetings plus a specialized youth survey (213 responses)

Policy Area Directions


63-80%

Overall Support for the Draft Plan



Findings

Support:

- More housing choice in all areas
- Complete neighbourhoods
- Job space
- Climate solutions (including green buildings, active transportation, greenways, blue-green systems, food systems)

Concern:

- Limited time for engagement
- Impact of the Plan on existing affordability
- Delivery of amenities with future growth
- Potential changes to (or loss of)
 neighbourhood character and identity



Findings continued...

Comments:

- Want to see the Plan deliver a bold, meaningful response to critical issues
- Differing opinions about the suitability of taller buildings in different areas of the city
- Desire to ensure future growth occurs equitably
- Questions related to implementation topics



Adjustments between Draft and Final Plan


- Clarity, consistency, fix errors

- Land use strategy technical composite map






Housing Needs

- About 86,000 existing households in Vancouver need better housing. Expected to increase by 50,000 over 10 years
- Equity-denied groups disproportionately impacted


Reconciliation

- Indigenous perspectives in planning and decision-making processes




Equity

- Withstand, adapt, recover and thrive










Housing

Economy


Vision: Vancouver has an economy that works for all, providing space for economic opportunities and support for local workers, employers and entrepreneurs.



Climate


Vision: Vancouver produces zero greenhouse gas emissions, while improving our resilience to the changing climate, capturing carbon and promoting sustainable consumption.






Ecology

Vision: Vancouver has reshaped its relationship to nature and restored its ecological health to the benefit and resilience of all.



Transportation

Vision: Vancouver's transportation system connects people to jobs and daily needs in an equitable way, prioritizing low-cost, healthy ways of getting around, while supporting the economy.



Childcare

Vision: Children and families in Vancouver can access licensed quality childcare in their neighbourhood as part of a universal system.







Community Infrastructure

Vision: Vancouver's community infrastructure meets the needs of all residents. It is resilient, equitably distributed and responsive to population growth and changing needs.










Arts, Culture & Heritage

Vision: Vancouver has elevated arts, culture and heritage in ways that reflect Vancouver's diversity, position on unceded territory, and right relations with Musqueam, Squamish, and Tsleil-Waututh Nations.



Public Space

Vision: Vancouver's public space network is welcoming, inclusive and resilient.










Watersheds & Water Resources

Vision: Vancouver has resilient water, sewer, and drainage systems that restore natural watershed functions, adapt to climate change, and serve communities equitably.



Food Systems

Vision: Vancouver's resilient food system supports people, the environment and the economy. Residents have equitable access to food and food-related spaces and infrastructure.








City building layers

- Distinction and variability














Metro Core/Broadway


Urban heart of the city and region





Municipal Town Centre


 A vibrant hub in the city that meets community, city-wide and regional needs






Rapid Transit Areas


 Areas within a 10-minute walk of existing or future rapid transit stations

- Oriented around local shopping streets, where people work, connect and access their daily needs




Neighbourhood Centre



Villages


- Oriented around a smaller collection of commercial and community uses
- Adjacent residential areas are mostly low-rise and often ground-oriented






Multiplex Areas

- A new type of groundoriented housing
- More affordable and sustainable option to single-detached homes

- Coordinate land use, infrastructure, amenities and finances




Implementation - Key Streams of Work

- Next step: Land Use Development Plan






Land Use Development Plan

- Update Process




Early Actions

- Example projects underway that align with Vancouver Plan Big Ideas and Council priorities:
 - Simplifying Development Regulations and Processes
 - Transforming Road Space
 - Renfrew and Rupert Station Area Plan
 - Multiplexes Pilot







Early Actions continued...

- Example projects underway:
 - Advancing Research for the Ecological Network
 - Updating Housing Vancouver's Three Year Action Plan
 - Updating Regulations for Home-Based Business
 - Updating Regulations to Intensify Industrial Land













The Vancouver Plan will

- Set a path to achieve the future the public told us they want for our city
- Help Vancouver become a more livable, affordable and sustainable city with a strong economy where people and nature thrive
- Introduce policies to advance Reconciliation, equity and resilience through land use planning
- Inform how and where we allocate resources over time – ensuring we are addressing areas of greatest need



Next steps

- Continued work with key partners on the delivery of the Vancouver Plan
- Further work to adopt the land use strategy
- Continued work on Council approved Early Actions
- Implementation work, including a review of existing plans to align with Vancouver Plan
