The cost of building exceeds most families incomes for a mortgage and so these units will be bought by the wealthy. For the neighborhoods, built many years ago with infrastructure to support schools, community centres, sewers etc., the increased density will dramatically alter them and require dramatic increases in infrastructure. As well, please consider that fire and police are infrastructure. Increased density will require increases to their budgets for staffing and resources at significant cost to the city and taxpayers.
