Report recommendations





- A. THAT Council approve, in principle, the approach, scope, and timeline for refreshing the Healthy City Strategy as Vancouver's overall strategic framework for social sustainability, as outlined in this report.
- B. THAT Council direct staff to report back with recommendations for the updated Healthy City strategic framework later in 2024.

- Updating the Healthy City Strategy is a Council strategic priority
- Staff propose a refresh of the Strategy in 2024 to:
 - Confirm Council's current social development priorities
 - Build on strengths of existing strategy
 - Develop clearer implementation roles and accountabilities
 - Respond to significant social change
- With approval of recommendations, staff will conduct research, targeted engagement, and policy development over summer and fall
- Refresh process supported by external funding and awards and existing positions

Health is an outcome of City policies and services



- Health is a universal experience and indicator of social sustainability
- **Most health outcomes** arise from social, economic, and environmental factors
- The City does not provide direct health services, but has a significant impact and influence on these determinants of health and benefits from a healthier, more engaged population

- **13 goals**: long-term outcomes aligned with determinants of health
- Monitoring framework and alignment tool for new strategies and actions

Refresh process: assumptions and areas of focus



- Proposing a **focused and targeted refresh**, not a full overhaul
- Key areas of focus:
 - 1. Implementation and governance, clarity on roles and jurisdiction
 - 2. Tools for collaborative action and clear accountability
 - 3. Confirm Council's current social development priorities
 - 4. Alignment across City departments and policies







How to best...

- **reinforce the framework** with core commitments to reconciliation, equity, and accessibility?
- **clarify City and partner roles**, including the level of City effort within each goal area?
- align on the most pressing priorities for near-term action?
- build clearer governance structures that support **partners in all sectors** to play a part?
- scale up our **monitoring and evaluation** infrastructure?
- integrate and align strategic and policy work?

Refresh process: proposed scope of engagement



- Feedback from Council
- Continued co-leadership with VCH
- Invite collaboration with Musqueam, Squamish, and Tsleil-Waututh, and Indigenous organizations
- **Collaborate** across City departments
- Involve and consult community partners and advisory tables
