Context

- In late 2023, staff received interest from BCLC in potentially expanding gaming at the City's two casinos: Parq and Hastings Racecourse
- Expanding gaming could
 - lead to additional revenue, which the City would be entitled to 10%, or additional public benefits pursuant to a rezoning
 - cause public health, social, and economic impacts, the extent of which have yet to be assessed – consultation required with Vancouver Coastal Health and Vancouver Police Department
- No applications yet due to City's 2011 moratorium on applications to expand gaming venues

Background – Gaming Timeline

- Extensive Council discussion and consideration since 1987 with respect to slot machines and gaming in Vancouver
- In 2002, the Province enacted the *Gaming Control Act*, which gives local governments the ability to
 - Approve or deny hosting gaming facilities in their jurisdiction
 - Regulate specific aspects of the gaming facility (size, number of slots and table games, and related issues like responsible gaming)
- The Provincial Gaming Policy and Enforcement Branch regulates all gaming in BC, including regulatory oversight of BCLC, which conducts and manages commercial gaming

Background - Gaming Facilities in Vancouver

- Two gaming facilities in Vancouver Parq casino and Hasting Racecourse casino
- As the host local government, the City receives 10% of the net casino revenue
 - In 2022/2023, the City received \$7.2 million: \$6.2 million from Parq and \$1 million from Hastings Racecourse
- The City also receives funding to offset the negative impacts of gaming: \$600,000 annually from Parq and approximately \$130,000 annually from Hastings Racecourse; Hastings Racecourse also pays the City operating fees of \$1.75 million per year for use of the City land at Hastings Park
- The City regulates the amount of gaming at each casino:

	Parq (permitted)	Parq (current)	Hastings (permitted)	Hastings (current)
Slots	600	600	600	446
Table games	75	61	0	0

Background - Gaming Moratorium

- Adopted by Council in 2011, in effect until Province or BCLC
 - Undertakes comprehensive public consultation on issue of expanded gambling; and
 - Implements internationally recognized best practices in responsible gaming and protection against money laundering and other criminal activity
- Prohibits any and all applications to expand gaming venues in the City of Vancouver
- The Moratorium directs the City to not accept either of
 - (1) applications to develop, use or operate a facility as a new gaming facility as described in section 18 (1) (a) of the Gaming Control Act or
 - (2) applications to substantially change the extent of lottery schemes at existing gaming facilities under section 18 (1) (c) of the Gaming Control Act.
- To allow a fulsome review of applications, the Moratorium would need to be addressed

Options Analysis

Staff have identified four options to address BCLC's inquiries:

- 1. Amend the Moratorium to allow consideration of applications for expansion of gaming at existing facilities (recommended option)
- 2. Lift the Moratorium entirely
- 3. Retain the Moratorium as the status quo
- 4. Have staff lead and resource a full assessment and analysis of public policy implications associated with amending or lifting the Moratorium

Options Analysis Option 1

	(Amend Moratorium)	(Lift Moratorium)	(Retain Moratorium)	(Staff Assessment)
Benefits	Allows for assessment of gambling expansion without erasing limitations. Supports potential increase in City revenue. Cost of public health and safety and economic impacts assessment required of the applicant.	Supports potential increase in City revenue. Sends clear message for potential future casino applications. Cost of public health and safety and economic impacts assessment required of the applicant.	Avoids additional public health and safety impacts of gambling expansion.	Provides a fuller, updated public policy analysis on gaming as a whole.
Risks	Potential public health and safety and economic impacts (to be considered as part of application assessment).	Potential public health and safety and economic impacts (to be considered as part of application assessment).	No opportunity to consider expanding gambling in the City. Lost opportunity to potentially increase City revenue.	Delays timeline to application consideration and potentially increased City revenue. Assessment is not on current workplan. Cost of assessment would fall to the City.

Recommendations and Next Steps

Recommendations

- A. THAT Council amend the gambling moratorium adopted by Council at its meeting of April 19, 2011 generally as described in Appendix A.*
- B. THAT Council require that any applications brought forward for Council consideration for gambling expansion in the City include an assessment of the health, social, and economic impacts of the proposals.
- *The amended moratorium (Option 1) would allow for applications for gaming expansion at existing gaming facilities, but not new facilities
- Next steps (if recommendations adopted): BCLC could submit rezoning or development permit applications for gaming expansion depending on the change
