## Goal of the Accessibility Strategy



# 25% aged 15 & over live with a disability. 113,000 people are age 65 & older.

- To build inclusive communities & provide an accessible environment
- The term "persons with disabilities" includes people who experience physical, mental health, cognitive, communication, intellectual, sensory, or age-related impairments, inclusive of seniors and people with lived experience of mental health challenges or substance-use-related disabilities.



## **Accessible BC Act**



The Accessible British Columbia Act (2021) lays out requirements for the following:

- Accessibility Plan
- Ongoing Accessibility Committee
- Ongoing Public Feedback Mechanism



## **Community Engagement**



- Facilitated 3 engagement sessions with disability communities (May to June 2023)
- Launched survey through Shape Your City, platform



- Developed "What We Heard" Report
  - Executive Summary included in Council Report (Appendix C)

## **Internal Working Group**



- Involved 38 staff across 10 departments & 19 divisions in the City.
- Held monthly meetings to identify and prioritize actions, based on input from Community Engagement and Accessibility Committee.
- Included representation from:

  - City Clerk's Office (CCO)
  - Civic Engagement and Communications (CEC)

# **Emergency Management and Climate Change**

#### Goal:

Apply an accessibility lens to all aspects of emergency and disaster mitigation, preparedness, response, and recovery.

## **Multi-Year Action Plan (MYAP)**




Includes a total of 106 actions across the nine focus areas, summarized as follows:

## **Examples of Work Completed**



- Reviewed Vancouver's Building By-law and Standards of Maintenance By-law to make sure that housing operators have plans and tools to repair broken elevators.
- Updated the accessible parking requirements to the Parking Bylaw for new developments.
- Updated the Zoning and Development By-law to result in more ground floor units with no entry stairs and allow for units on a single level.
- Added accessibility considerations to standardized communications templates and practices.
- Created disability awareness course for staff.

## **Examples of Work in Progress**



- Implement the Rick Hansen accessibility standards where feasible for the remainder of existing City-owned buildings.
- Improve navigation measures through city-wide programs and pedestrian upgrades.
- Reduce accessibility barriers on sidewalks and pathways through city-wide programs and pedestrian access upgrades.
- Explore changes to the City's Building By-Law to improve accessibility in existing regulations and policies with the upcoming changes to the BC Building Code to advance accessibility.
- Create plain language materials and provide options that consider accessibility barriers in communications and engagement activities.

## **Accountability Reporting**



The Accountability Framework was approved in 2022 as part of the Accessibility Strategy. It includes:

- Quarterly updates to the Accessibility Committee and City Leadership Team
- Annual progress report to Council
- Three-year progress report to the BC Government
- Review outcomes, impacts and effectiveness of Accessibility Strategy in five years
