




Transforming Road Space

CEAP mode share target




Increase trips by sustainable transportation

Trip volumes continue to rebound



Where did people with a 'regular place of work' actually work?



Working from home has become 'the new normal' for many people.

Four years after the pandemic, almost a quarter of workers with a regular place of work still work from home.

Vision Zero Goal: eliminate traffic-related fatalities and serious injuries



Safety is embedded throughout the City's transportation programs Engineering Enforcement

- Advancing a safe active travel network

- Corridor and spot improvement programs












2024 program expansion: 15 schools along 10 corridors

+ 10 more corridors per year in 2025 and 2026

2023 pilot results (9 schools) Speeds reduced by 4 to 15% Strong support from parents

- - 92% support changes
 - 70% felt students were safer
 - 50% felt more likely to walk or bike





Active transportation network

Building a network that is safe and comfortable for people of all ages, abilities and backgrounds

- 1,500+ km of city streets* (over 2,800 lane km)
- 2,200+ km of city sidewalks (~80% complete)
- 300+ km of bike network

(~30% all ages and abilities)

Designing for all ages and abilities: no one-size-fits all approach








Operational this summer

Intersection treatment to prioritize pedestrians and reduce conflicts with vehicles

- Allow pedestrians to cross during concurrent green phase
- Vehicle turn movements already restricted except buses (westbound right-turn)
- No right turn on red



We are updating our safety strategy to help prioritize locations, expand programs, and improve our toolkit.

We will be reporting back this fall on safety-related issues including reduced speed limits, LPIs, road marking maintenance, and more.





Motor Vehicle Act updates

Changes by the Province to support safety and accessibility

New Provincial legislation will improve safety, support new technology, and prioritize people with disabilities



Safe passing

to better protect vulnerable road users

• E-bikes

to allow younger people to use low-power pedal assist devices

- Mobility devices to prioritize people with disabilities
- Autonomous vehicles to prohibit full autonomy unless authorized by Province

Transit: 2023 Ridership Snapshot



Addressing overcrowding



Bus overcrowding has surpassed pre-pandemic levels

More than 10% of bus trips were overcrowded in 2023

New service is being added this fall to address overcrowding

- Over 30,000 annual service hours allocated to routes in Vancouver/UBC
- Substantial increases to 99, 49, and R4

Bus priority

Bus delay due to congestion can be reduced.



Adding a peak period bus lane saved 12% travel time (5 min per round trip) on Granville St



Transit priority toolkit

- Bus lanes
- Turn pockets & queue-jumpers
- Signal priority & turn restrictions
- Bus bulbs and bus stop balancing

Speeding up buses on key corridors

Three-year priorities include: Hastings, Granville, Kingsway, 49th Ave, Marine Drive

Targeting **10% travel time savings** on 5 high-delay corridors

TransLink expects to save **\$2M** in operating costs each year, to reinvest in more transit service





- Regional mayors have asked for support from Province and Federal government





2023 budget increase supported higher service levels for horticulture maintenance:

- 171 median gardens vs. 113 in 2022
- Transition to 'natural management' approach for meadows project (~4,000 m²)

Plaza & Parklet Management

Upgraded Service for 2024

Regular Microcleaning

- 26 plazas & 9 social service parklets
- Daily in high season (May Nov)
- 3x a week in low season (Dec Apr)



Seasonal response

Leaf Pickup & Removal: 2x a month at plazas (Oct – Jan)

Power Washing:

- 22 plazas, 12 social service parklets and 6 public parklets
- 4x year



Partner support Planter watering Umbrella care Day-to-day tidying Monitoring & reporting Programming & Activations



Support Local Filming

2023 was a difficult year and many productions were affected

- International labour disputes significantly impacted Canadian film industry for +6 months
- Electrification (PREP): 27% of productions replaced at least one diesel generator and qualified for the clean energy incentive.




Parking Enforcement Improvements



Working towards safer and more effective curbside management

So far:

- Deployed License Plate Recognition (LPR) system
- LPR enforcing 30% of residential permit parking & time-limited parking
- LPR and pay station upgrade timing linked
- A safer enforcement tool for staff



Shared Micromobility: Public Bikeshare

Mobi by Rogers public bikeshare system has had +6 million rides since 2018.

- 2023: First year with +1 Million Rides
- 2024: Aiming to beat 2023 records
- E-bikes are driving ridership growth
- Expansion to Point Grey & UBC
- New community passes for Persons with Disabilities and Youth enabling new riders
- 18 PBS locations electrified on street right of way by 2024 end
