

Background



Established in 1986 as an Inventory, became a Register in 1994

The Vancouver Heritage Register or VHR is a Council-approved listing of historic places which have heritage value.

The Heritage Register is a land planning tool which provides a record of Vancouver's built heritage.

In 2020 Council approved the Vancouver Heritage Program including direction for staff to update and modernize the Register.

Summary



Align with the Council-approved direction in Vancouver Heritage Program (2020)

- Refocus the VHR policy to relate to built-heritage
- Update and modernize evaluation methodology
- Align with Standards and Guidelines for the Conservation of Historic Places in Canada



Truth & Reconciliation

- Inform need to develop tool for intangible cultural values
- Respond to UNDRIP and Truth-telling statement
- Remove Euro-centric bias and embrace diverse, inclusive and equity approaches to heritage



Simplify Process

- New integrated data management plan
- Content updates with clear and consistent formatting
- Better meet COV accessibility standards



Previous Council decisions


Consultation and engagement



Comprehensive process over two years

Summary:

- Over 35 virtual and in-person meetings with Musqueam, Squamish and Tsleil-Waututh Nations
- 12 civic advisory bodies
- External stakeholder groups: VHF and HVC
- Heritage professional consultants
- Internal teams
- Open houses (at the VHP stage)
- Surveys



Identified shortcomings



VHR inconsistent with:

- Vancouver Heritage Program (set priorities for inclusion and cultural redress)
- Truth & Reconciliation (City of Reconciliation)
- Vancouver Charter (focusing on real property)
- Standards and Guidelines for the Conservation of Historic Places in Canada
- COV Accessibility Standards (legibility and access)
- COV Data Management framework (integration and efficiency)
- Permit Improvement Process (improved heritage review time)

The VHR Upgrade aims to modernize the register by incorporating Indigenous land acknowledgements and reflecting Vancouver's diverse communities by including associated intangible cultural and social values

Emerging directions



VHR - primarily a land-planning tool for built heritage

VHR - not a tool for Intangible Cultural Heritage

Need for development of planning tools for Intangible Cultural Heritage

Emerging directions:

- Re-focus VHR policy to relate to built-heritage resources
- Receive feedback from Musqueam, Squamish & Tsleil-Waututh Nations
- Modernize VHR to embrace principles of cultural diversity and equity
- Improve heritage evaluation methodology to reflect tangible and intangible values
- Update the VHR policy to meet COV accessibility standards
- Integrate new data base management plan
- Improve permit processing and heritage review time

VHR policies



A place that is 20 years or older

Heritage value identified in one of the three categories

Property owner's written consent

Vancouver Heritage Commission endorsement

Council approves addition to the VHR

Heritage value categories:

- 1. Cultural Traditions, Ways of Life, Memories
- 2. Association with Person, Community or Organization
- 3. Design, Materials, and Technology

Application streams:

- Self-initiated / Online
- Permit application process

VHR Heritage Evaluation Methodology



Old VHR methodology: Euro-centric values bias

New VHR methodology: embracing diversity, inclusivity, equity

Findings:

- Architectural bias, focused on tangible
- Age bias of original survey
- Bias against use
- Marginal socio-cultural values
- Lack of cultural diversity
- Lack of community input

Improvements:

- New Heritage Evaluation Methodology and Criteria
- New Heritage Evaluation Form
- New online application option (outside of permit application process)



VHR Policy - intangible cultural values



New VHR Policy and evaluation methodology acknowledge intangible culture alongside physical attributes of a historic place



VHR Evaluation Methodology supports diverse community values of a place.

VHR Format



VHR - Schedule, and Appendix for reference purpose

Findings:

- Outdated ranked evaluation system (A,B,C)
- Categories outside of the VHR
 primary mandate (Trees, Parks,
 Streetscapes, Archeology, Monuments)
 –128 items
- Non-evaluated and non-classified (currently listed but not counted as heritage) – 92 items

Improvements:


- Streamlined data entry, simplified analysis and reporting

- Online VHR application form
- Updated COV Heritage web page
- Permitting system (Posse) notes

VHR content



VHR Upgrade is about policy and process improvements and not about new additions. Addison or removal of properties to the VHR will continue to be managed through regular annual VHR Update reports to Council.

Truth & Reconciliation



Feedback from Musqueam, Squamish & Tsleil-Waututh Nations:







- Musqueam, Squamish & Tsleil-Waututh Nations identified cultural heritage as top priority during consultation
- VHR inherently colonial, reflecting Euro-centric values, and continues to cause harm to Musqueam, Squamish & Tsleil-Waututh Nations
- Nations not interested in engaging on VHR in current format, but interested in codeveloping new tools that better recognize Indigenous Cultural Heritage

UNDRIP Strategy

UNDRIP Strategy:

 Incorporate direction received through strategy into VHR deliverables (such as CTA 4.7a)

MST Feedback:

 Support self-expressed priorities of the Nations regarding their cultural heritage and how they wish to be reflected in VHR



 Now: Truth-Telling Statement in VHR policy document; land acknowledgements

 On-going: Co-development of new heritage management tools that better recognize Indigenous Cultural Heritage with MIB, SN & TWN – 2024

Note: Co-development of new tools to commence after Council approval of the VHR Upgrade and in collaboration with other COV departments
