According to ICBC public data, Arbutus Street saw a 34.5% increase in traffic accidents from 2020 to 2023, with crashes rising from 203 to 273. Additionally, nearby 16th Street experienced a 75% increase in accidents from 2022 to 2023. These data-driven trends highlight the growing traffic and safety concerns in the area. Furthermore, the proposed development is located near a highly populated walking and biking corridor, just 1-2 blocks away, which increases the exposure of pedestrians and cyclists to traffic risks. With multiple high- density buildings already under construction in the vicinity, this project would likely exacerbate traffic congestion and further elevate accident risks in the neighborhood.
