# Provincial & City Roles in Liquor Licensing



- The liquor licensing process is primarily administered by the Province who oversees application intake, review, public consultation, and final approval.
- Municipalities may provide input but do not control the overall timeline or outcome.

Liquor licence application intake & review	Primary lead	Provides input
Community consultation	Sets requirements	May coordinate
Final inspection & approval	Conducted by LCRB	Not involved
Liquor licence decision	Final authority	Not involved

## City of Vancouver: Land Use & Business Licensing



Land Use

Zoning & permits for liquor locations

Business Licensing

Sets operational requirements including for safety and community impact mitigation

**Operating Hours** 

Sets operating and liquor service hours within provincial limits

**Local Government Input** 

Provide resolution to Province on new and amended Provincial liquor licences

# Recent Updates to Liquor Regulations



#### December 2023

- Removed distance requirements
- Removed moratorium in GED and five DTES sub areas
- Expanded 3am closing to more areas Downtown
- Increased maximum capacity next to residential from 150 to 200 persons
- Enabled dual-licence restaurants to transition into a bar starting at 9pm
- Enabled non-traditional liquor-serving establishments (i.e. barbershops)
- Council delegated authority to CLI to provide recommendations to LCRB

Saving up to 4 weeks

# Liquor Establishments and Restaurants Regulatory Review

### Scope of Review



- Liquor Establishment (i.e., bars, nightclubs) operating hours
- Restaurant alcohol service hours
- Licence requirements
- Temporary extension of hours policy for special events
- Procedural policies for brand new operators
- Consolidating business hours into one by-law

#### **Objectives**

- To support businesses, local economies, and neighbourhood vibrancy while considering neighbourhood livability, public health and safety
- To update and modernize liquor regulations
- To respond to feedback from the Hospitality Sector Working Group and industry

#### Stakeholder Feedback



Significant support to expand operating and service hours citywide among public and stakeholders with differing opinions on how the hours should be set.

#### What we heard:

- Some desire for 4am closure
- Same set of latest closing hours Citywide
- Later hours Downtown than outside Downtown

Industry supported the proposed changes to streamline and update City licensing requirements.

# Public Safety & Public Health Considerations



#### **Public Safety**

- Some risk of late-night disorder, violence, over-consumption
- Risk of impact on late night resources, Police can monitor impacts & consider resourcing based on service calls
- If a substantial rise in calls occurs, resource allocation may need to be reconsidered

#### **Public Health**

 Expanding liquor service hours will lead to increased consumption and related health harms, including additional burden on the healthcare system

# **Proposed Operating Hour Changes**



- Downtown
  - 3am closing time for all establishments
  - Extends closing hours for 41% of establishments
- Outside Downtown, including DTES Oppenheimer District
  - 2am weeknight/3am weekend closing times for all establishments
  - Extends closing hours for 97% of establishments
- City-wide
  - 9am opening time for all establishments
  - Extends opening hour for 42% of establishments

#### Considerations for 4am



#### Requires additional VPD resources and funding

- At minimum, LIMA units extended by one hour in GED
- Additional costs may be incurred if calls for service increase after 3am

#### Increases risks associated with longer liquor service hours

- Late-night street disorder including property crime and vandalism
- Increased violence
- Over-consumption of liquor
- Increased hospitalizations and burden on emergency services
- Noise and nuisance

#### Vancouver already has the latest operating hours

- Most neighbouring municipalities have 2am closing
- Liquor service must end by 2am in Toronto and Calgary; 3am in Montreal

# Key Changes – Making it Easier to do Business 🥸



#### **Supporting New Businesses from Day One**

- New businesses can operate at full hours right away, no waiting period.
- Outcomes: Enables full business operation, especially during the first months of operation which are important for long-term success.

#### **Cutting overlapping requirements**

- City licensing requirements that duplicate provincial rules are being removed.
- Outcomes: Makes it simpler and easier to do business.

#### **Updated Safety Standards**

- Businesses get more autonomy in how they meet safety and security requirements.
- Outcomes: Provides flexibility to businesses in how they operate while maintaining public safety.

# Key Changes – Enabling more Opportunities



#### **Later Closing Times for a More Vibrant Downtown**

- All Downtown bars and nightclubs will be able to stay open until 3am.
- Outcomes: Supports businesses, tourism and nightlife vibrancy.

#### **Late Weekend Hours for All Neighbourhoods**

- Bars outside Downtown will be able to stay open until 3am on weekends and 2am on weeknights.
- Outcomes: Enables later hours on weekends, while protecting neighbourhood livability on weekdays. Supports more late-night options closer to home.

#### Same opening times citywide

- All Liquor Establishments will be able to open at 9am regardless of licence type.
- Outcomes: Provides flexibility to operate for early events such as live televised sports
  that often occur during morning hours; eliminating the need to apply for earlier hours.

#### **More Flexibility for Temporary Extensions**

- Businesses can stay open until 4am for up to six special events per year with a wider selection of eligible events.
- Outcomes: Increases revenue opportunities for businesses to participate in local festivals, concerts, and major celebrations.
