SUBJECT: 2025 Cultural Grants (Equity, Indigenous, Redress, Spaces, Public Art)

Recommendations

- A. THAT Council approve 24 Cultural Equity and Accessibility grants totalling \$505,500 from the 2025 Cultural Grants Operating Budget to the organizations listed in Appendix A for the amounts recommended for each organization in the "Grant Recommendation" column.
- B. THAT Council approve 12 Cultural Indigenous grants totalling \$324,500 from the 2025 Cultural Grants Operating Budget, and 3 Indigenous Language Revitalization Grants totalling \$75,000 from the 2025 Arts and Culture Operating Budget, to the organizations listed in Appendix A for the amounts recommended for each organization in the "Grant Recommendation" column.
- C. THAT Council approve three grants to support Cultural Redress commitments totalling \$70,000 from the 2025 Arts and Culture Operating Budget to the organizations listed in the section titled "Cultural Redress Grants" in Appendix A for the amounts in the "Grant Recommendation" column.
- D. THAT Council approve a grant of \$30,000 from the 2025 Cultural Grants Operating Budget to the Greater Vancouver Professional Theatre Alliance to support REFLECT.
- E. THAT Council approve a Making Space for Arts and Culture grant of \$175,000 to the Vancouver Concert Hall and Theatre Society to support development of Phase II of their Cultural Precinct Feasibility Study to be funded from the Coal Harbour Arts Complex Reserve.
- F. THAT, subject to the approval of Recommendation E, Council approve an increase to the 2023-2026 Capital Plan and the Multi-Year Capital Project Budget

for the Cultural Spaces program by \$175,000, to be funded from the Coal Harbour Arts Complex Reserve.

- G. THAT Council approve amended conditions as further described in the section titled "Recommendation G" on page 7 of this Council Report, for the disbursement of the Making Space for Arts and Culture grant of \$1,500,000 from the Vancouver Cultural Spaces Fund to the Dance Foundation to procure the Vancouver Dance Centre site, as detailed in the Council Report (RTS 16100) approved on May 29, 2024, via RTS 16100.
- H. THAT Council authorize an annual transfer of \$160,000 from the Georgia Street (Shangri-La) Public Art Reserve to the Arts and Culture Operating Budget to fund on-going operations of "Art Atlas" (formerly "Offsite") at 1100 West Georgia Street.
- I. THAT Council delegate its authority to the General Manager of Arts, Culture and Community Services to negotiate and execute agreements to disburse the grants described in Recommendations A to G on the terms and conditions set out herein or such other terms and conditions as are satisfactory to the General Manager of Arts, Culture and Community Services and the Director of Legal Services.
- J. THAT pursuant to Section 206(1)(j) of the *Vancouver Charter*, Council deems any organization listed in Appendix A that is not otherwise a registered charity with Canada Revenue Agency to be contributing to the culture of Vancouver.
- K. THAT no legal rights or obligations will arise or be created by Council's adoption of these Recommendations unless and until all legal documentation has been executed and delivered by the respective parties.

Recommendations A to G and I require at least 2/3 affirmative votes of all Council members under section 206(1) of the Vancouver Charter.

Purpose and Executive Summary

This report recommends \$1,180,000 in grants to 44 cultural organizations, and ongoing funding to continue public art programming at 1100 West Georgia Street.

These recommendations support key civic policy and strategic directions as follows:

- Vibrant Vancouver: City Council's Strategic Priorities 2023-2026
- Culture|Shift, the City's 10-year culture plan, including the Vancouver Music Strategy and Making Space for Arts and Culture
- The City's Reconciliation Framework and UNDRIP Action Plan 2024-2028
- The City's Equity Framework and Accessibility Strategy
- The City's Chinatown Cultural District Framework

Council Authority/Previous Decisions

- July 5, 2022: Council approved the Historical Discrimination Against People of South Asian Canadian Descent report, identifying priorities for the preservation of South Asian Canadian community spaces.
- May 30, 2023: Council supported the Commemoration of the Komagata Maru incident through a Secondary Naming of a Street, with next steps exploring potential funding sources for the Komagata Maru Museum at the Khalsa Diwan Society.
- December 11, 2024: Council motion to support a Japanese Canadian Interpretive Centre at Hastings Park.
- May 7, 2025: Council approved a motion directing staff to review the Vancouver Concert Hall and Theatre Society's (VCHTS') Phase I Cultural Precinct Feasibility Study, and to continue working with VCHTS on scoping and development of Phase II of the Study.
- June 4, 2025: Council directed staff to report back to Council with recommendations to
 potentially allocate funds to VCHTS from the Coal Harbour Arts Complex Reserve for
 Phase II of the Feasibility Study in an amount up to \$250,000.
- May 29, 2024: Council approved an extraordinary grant of \$1,500,000 to support the Dance Foundation in securing and procuring the land at 677 Davie Street.

City Manager's Comments

The City Manager concurs with the foregoing recommendations.

Context and Background

The City of Vancouver invests in operating and capital grants to local arts and culture non-profit organizations that advance the City's arts and culture priorities and a culturally vibrant community and local economy. Grants support operations, projects, capacity building, cultural spaces, and access to the civic theatres. The distribution and impact of cultural grant streams and other grants are reported through the ACCS Annual Grant Impact Report.

This report is the fourth in a series of 2025 annual cultural grant recommendations presented to Council, focusing on two grant streams developed to achieve greater equity for those who have been historically underfunded or unrecognized in funding programs:

- Cultural Equity and Accessibility Funding
- Cultural Indigenous Funding

Funding is also recommended to advance cultural redress commitments, invest in arts leaders from equity-deserving communities, support cultural infrastructure, and deliver public art programming.

Discussion

This report outlines priorities and processes for grants recommended to Council. A full list of applicants and recommended grantees is in Appendix A, with grant metrics in Appendix B.

Grant recommendations A and B were determined by peer assessment committees, where members of the arts and culture sector and City staff evaluate applications based on program priorities. Community assessors were Julia Aoki, Pawan Deol, Moroti George, Michelle Olson, and Quelemia Sparrow, bringing a wide range of professional and lived experience. Staff recognize the thoughtful consideration of these assessors throughout the process.

Recommendation A: Cultural Equity and Accessibility Funding

Cultural Equity and Accessibility Funding (CEAF), previously called the Cultural Equity Grant program, was launched in 2020 as a key action of *Culture*|*Shift* to achieve greater equity in the City's support for arts and culture. This program provides core support for organizations led by and for equity and/or accessibility-deserving communities, funding arts and cultural programming and capacity building. This low-barrier program uses a relational approach to honour and respect the deep knowledge held by equity-deserving organizations. Approving these grants would renew funding for 12 organizations and provide operational support for 12 new organizations, supporting artists, programs, and spaces that reflect their communities.

Recommendation B: Cultural Indigenous Funding

Cultural Indigenous Funding (CIF), previously called the Cultural Indigenous Grant program, was launched in 2019 to advance Reconciliation goals in *Culture*|*Shift* to increase investment and leadership opportunities for x^wməθkwəyəm (Musqueam), Skwxwú7mesh Úxwumixw (Squamish) and səlilwətał (Tsleil-Waututh) Nations, and Urban Indigenous artists. This program supports Indigenous arts, culture, and language initiatives, and provides core support for organizations led by Indigenous communities. This low-barrier program offers a more relational, flexible process and reflects Indigenous self-determined ways. Approving these grants would renew funding for five organizations and provide operational support for four new organizations.

The three local First Nations are recommended to receive \$40,000 for self-determined cultural projects that are creating access to history, language, and places for their communities. An additional \$25,000 is recommended to support self-determined language revitalization priorities. This funding advances UNDRIP Action Plan recommendations for the City to support, revitalize, and promote local Indigenous languages, while ensuring Indigenous partners are resourced.

Recommendation C: Cultural Redress Grants

Having formally acknowledged and apologized for its role in various forms of historic discrimination by past City Councils, including lobbying the Federal government for discriminatory immigration policies such as the 1923 Chinese Immigration Act, complicity and support for the forced relocation and internment of Japanese Canadians, and the refusal of passengers from Guru Nanak Jahaz (Komagata Maru), the City of Vancouver has committed to community-based cultural redress initiatives towards recognizing past harms, supporting public education/awareness about these histories, and supporting focussed community development initiatives related to these communities.

Strategic one-time grants are being recommended to Chinatown Society Heritage Buildings Association, Japanese Canadian Interpretive Centre Society, and Khalsa Diwan Society. Funding will support capacity building and aligns with previous Council direction to support the ongoing vitality of Chinese Society buildings, further work on a Japanese Canadian Interpretive Centre at Hastings Park, and identifying priorities for the preservation of South Asian Canadian community spaces and next steps of assisting Khalsa Diwan Society to source funding for the Komagata Maru Museum. All three projects focus on key planning work necessary to support the preservation, restoration and stewardship of significant cultural assets that tell the history of exclusion from community-based perspectives. These plans will lay the groundwork required prior to any significant capital infrastructure renewal, development and/or investment.

Recommendation D: Arts and Culture Grant – REFLECT

Radical Empathy for Leaders: Equity, Connection, Time (REFLECT) is a cohort-based program for arts leaders from Indigenous and equity-deserving groups, launched in 2023 as a pilot project by the City of Vancouver in partnership with the Greater Vancouver Professional Theatre Alliance and The Cultch. This third and final grant for the multi-year program will allow REFLECT to serve a second cohort. By nurturing underrepresented arts leaders, this grant represents an impactful investment supporting *Culture*|*Shift* and *Vibrant Vancouver* objectives, strengthening diverse cultural representation, and creating a culturally rich and inclusive city.

Recommendations E and F: Vancouver Concert Hall and Theatre Society Grant

Staff are recommending a capital grant of \$175,000 to the Vancouver Concert Hall and Theatre Society ('VCHTS') to support Phase II of a Cultural Precinct Feasibility Study, and to advance related Council direction. The Society's Phase I study identified that Vancouver has a lower number of performing arts seats of comparable cities and proposed that new and renewed facilities are needed. The findings broadly align with *Making Space for Arts and Culture* and the *Vancouver Music Strategy*, which identify the need for new performance spaces of various sizes across the city. Phase II will further develop the technical and financial feasibility of a future Cultural Precinct. Work will include engagement with Musqueam, Squamish, Tsleil-Waututh Nations and partner organizations, design and technical studies on types and sizes of venue, a high-level renovation feasibility assessment for existing City-owned theaters, exploration of potential site(s), high level cost estimates, and an economic study.

Given that the Study may reference aspects of City-owned facilities, staff recommend attaching conditions to the grant to ensure clarity of roles and practical outcomes. These include regular touchpoints with VCHTS' project leads, inclusion of venue options independent of City facility renovations, exploration of multiple site options and a distributed precinct model, and City oversight of Study content related to City responsibilities. The grant will also be conditional upon receipt of quotes for the proposed Economic Study.

The grant is proposed to be funded from the Coal Harbour Arts Complex Reserve. Supporting planning and feasibility work for a future performance venue is consistent with the Reserve's broad purpose. Staff recognize that allocating Reserve funds to high-level feasibility analysis reduces the resources available for implementation and construction of a possible venue. This trade-off has been considered and informs staff's recommendation. The recommendation responds to Council's direction and ensures the study produces clear outcomes to inform the City's future capital planning and decisions. Additional background can be found in Appendix C.

City funding for the Cultural Precinct Feasibility Study supports exploration of the Cultural Precinct concept and does not represent endorsement of or commitment to recommendations in both Phase I and II of the study. The City's role and level of involvement in the future Cultural Precinct will be determined following staff review of the Phase II outcomes, including feasibility of the City-owned Larwill Park site, and further direction from Council through a subsequent staff report.

Recommendation G: Amendment of Terms for a Making Space for Arts and Culture Capital Grant to support the Dance Foundation

On May 29, 2024 (RTS 16100), Council approved an extraordinary *Making Space for Arts and Culture* grant of \$1,500,000 from the Vancouver Cultural Spaces Fund to the Dance Foundation to help procure the Scotiabank Dance Centre site. As owners of the Granville Street purposebuilt dance facility, the Dance Foundation has a time-limited opportunity to purchase the site at a fixed price from the current landowner, Scotiabank.

The grant was approved subject to the Dance Foundation securing required funding, review and confirmation of the sale, and registration of a community use agreement (CUA) preserving continued use of the site as a non-profit dance centre providing affordable spaces for artists and local non-profit dance organizations for the benefit of the citizens of Vancouver in perpetuity.

Since approval, the Dance Foundation has been actively fundraising and indicated that the "in perpetuity" condition is a barrier to securing the remaining purchase funds, as the perpetual covenant limits financing options. Staff recommend amending the CUA to apply for the duration of the later of the life of the existing building or a minimum of 20 years. This amendment maintains the intent of the original condition to preserve the use while supporting the Foundation's ability to leverage the funding needed to complete the acquisition.

Recommendation H: Public Art Programming at 1100 West Georgia

Since 2009, the City of Vancouver, the Shangri-La Hotel and Residences, and the Vancouver Art Gallery have partnered on the "Offsite" program, which addressed a long-standing need for a site in Vancouver to program temporary exhibitions of public art. Over the past 15 years, "Offsite" has presented 26 public art projects in a plaza on 1100 West Georgia Street, created specifically for the site by significant artists from Vancouver and around the world, with a particular focus on artists from Asia. The Vancouver Art Gallery Association received annual funding from the City's Georgia Street (Shangri-La) Public Art Reserve (the "Reserve") to deliver the "Offsite" program.

The Vancouver Art Gallery is no longer interested in continuing the "Offsite" program. Given the desire of the downtown community to see continued programming, and the intention of the Shangri-La Hotel to continue providing \$160,000 annually, the City of Vancouver's Public Art program proposes a new civic program titled "Art Atlas" to program the 1100 West Georgia site, by working with local and international curators to deliver rotating, large-scale temporary artwork of varying mediums by international artists. The intention of "Art Atlas" is to maintain the same ethos as "Offsite" offering the opportunity for top tier artists from across the globe to create site-specific public art installations of varying mediums for one year. The proposed program also offers opportunities for supporting local emerging and established curators to gain experience in delivering public art projects.

Staff are seeking authorization of on-going annual transfers from the Reserve to the Arts and Culture operating budget to enable 'Art Atlas', for as long as Shangri-La funding continues. If the Shangri-La funding ceases, staff will review the program at that time and return to Council as needed to seek direction relating to ongoing programming of the site. Ongoing funding for "Art Atlas" will support artists, curators, and the fabrication of exceptional artwork of international significance to contribute towards a vibrant Vancouver for all local communities and tourists to enjoy.

Financial Implications

The sources of funding for these recommendations are the 2025 Cultural Grants Operating and Capital Budget and the 2025 Arts and Culture Operating Budget, as summarized in Table 1.

APPENDIX C BACKGROUND ON THE CULTURAL PRECINCT PROJECT AND STAFF'S GRANT RECOMMENDATION

This appendix provides further background to support staff's grant recommendation as outlined in this report.

Related Council Motions

On May 7, 2025, Council directed staff to review the Vancouver Concert Hall and Theatre Society ('VCHTS') Phase 1 report and to continue working with VCHTS on scoping and development of the Phase 2 Feasibility Study. Council also directed staff to explore the potential of locating the proposed new performance venues on the City-owned site at Larwill Park that would complement the envisioned new Vancouver Art Gallery.

On June 3, 2025, Council further directed staff "to report back to Council to potentially allocate funds to the Society from the Coal Harbour Arts Complex Reserve for Phase 2 of the Feasibility Study in an amount up to \$250,000".

Project Background

The VCHTS is a coalition of 31 performing arts organizations. The VCHTS is leading a study for a Cultural Precinct concept which envisions a centralized Downtown cultural precinct with new and renovated performing venues. The City of Vancouver provided a \$125,000 grant in 2024 to the Society for Phase 1 Feasibility Study (the 'Study'). VCHTS also received funding support from the Provincial and Federal governments. Phase 1 of the Study is completed and indicated that Vancouver has less performing arts seats than comparable cities. The Study proposes a new concert hall and renovated Vancouver Civic Theatres facilities which is recommended to be further explored in Phase 2.

Phase 2 Feasibility Study and Grant Recommendation

The Society submitted an application for a \$250,000 grant to the City for Phase 2 of the study, to be completed in summer 2026. The Society is seeking other government grants and has secured financial contributions to the study from its members. Staff recommends a grant of \$175,000 based on assessment of eligible scope items and against established program criteria. Source of funds is proposed to be the Coal Harbour Arts Complex Reserve.

Coal Harbour Arts Complex Reserve Background

The Coal Harbour Complex Reserve fund is a Community Amenity Contribution (CAC) provided to the City in the 1990s. This Reserve was established specifically for the construction of a mid-size concert hall and arts complex in downtown Vancouver. The funding originated from the redevelopment of the Coal Harbour site which ultimately proceeded as the Vancouver Trade and Convention Centre without including the arts component. The Reserve totals approximately \$33.7 million, including interest accrued. Planning studies towards a capital project is consistent with its intended purpose, and several planning studies towards a future Cultural Precinct have been funded since its establishment. Staff recommend that planning initiatives continue to be funded from interest earnings to maintain a minimum of \$30M in capital for potential construction or renewal of performance facilities. Should Council approve the grant of \$175,000, approximately \$33.5M will remain in the Reserve.
